STONE AGE'S OYSTER DIET IS DISPUTED BY LAYMAN

COPENHAGEN (AP)—A mere layman, M. Kluge, a dairy manager, is challenging the scientific theory that some of our stone-age ancestors lived largely upon oysters.

Scientists have theorized from the huge deposits of oyster shells, the so-called "kitchen middens" found everywhere in Denmark, that the stone-age diet was heavy on bivalves.

Kluge, however, doubts if they ate oysters at all. His theory, after some study, is that they merely used the shells to line the walls of fire pits, because of their great heat-retaining qualities.

TAX RETURN 40 CENTS OFF; IT GOES BACK TO SCOTLAND

SUPERIOR, Wis. (AP)—Duncan Grant, who lives in Scotland, hereafter will have to send the correct amount of his tax assessment to City Treasurer George Ostrom.

Ostrom made the ruling when he found Grant's remittance for personal property taxes this spring 40 cents short. He said he wouldn't object if this were the first time, but that Grant has been from 10 to 25 cents short each year with his money orders.

This year's deficit was the largest yet and Ostrom sent the order back with a reminder to make the remittance for the full amount due.

African and Indian Ivory

The tusks of African elephants are somewhat larger than those of Indian animals. An Indian elephant's tusks may be 9 feet long and 100 pounds in weight, while those of a full-grown African elephant are rarely less than ten feet in length and weigh as much as 250 pounds. These are average figures and individuals may greatly surpass them.

Escaped Convict Found in Italy

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah (AP)—John Anselmo who escaped from Utah state prison in 1915 while serving a life sentence for killing a policeman has been found in an Italian prison doing a term for robbery. Utah authorities have started a movement for extradition.

LONDON (AP)—Jacob Epstein, the sculptor, whose forceful work has created many an artistic uproar in London, is doing a bust of Harriet Hector, dainty American dancer now starring in a revue here.

Bonus in "Contract"

In progressive contract, a game is made when one side bids and makes a trick score of 100 points or more in one hand. In addition to the trick score the premium for game is 500 points if not vulnerable and 500 points if vulnerable. The side having the higher score after four deals gets a bonus of 250. If both sides have exactly the same score, each of the four players receives a bonus of 25 points.

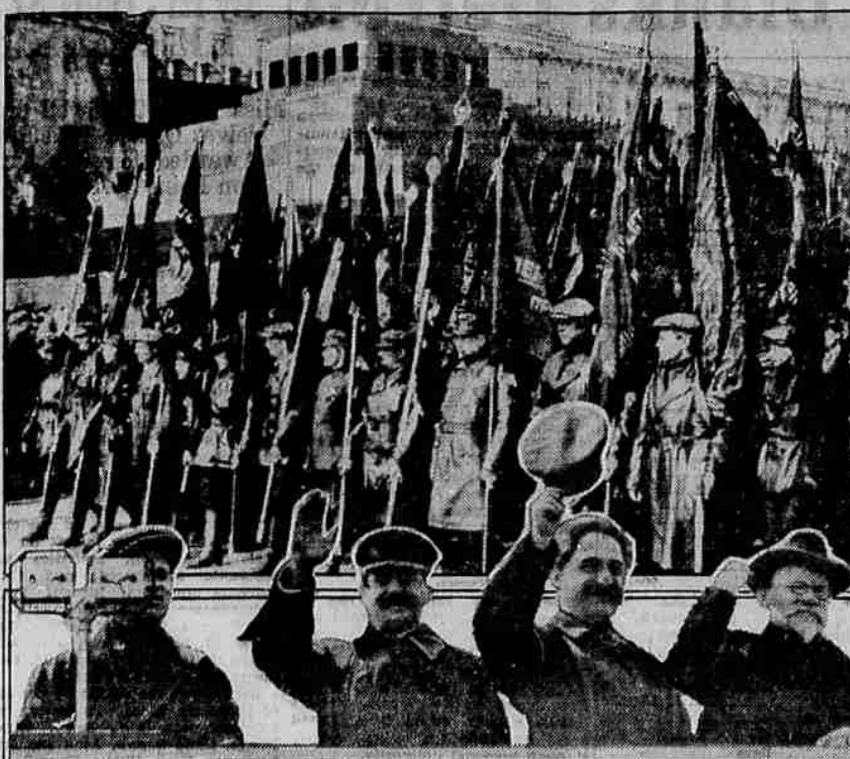
German Gets Windfall

MAYOR OF CAROLINA TOWN LIVES IN DIFFERENT CITY

SYLVA, N. C. (AP)—H. E. Buchanan is mayor of Sylva, but a resident of Hendersonville, 70 miles away.

Mayor Buchanan, for a decade prominent in civic and political affairs of this little mountain city, was elected mayor last June.

Recently it became necessary for him to move away to care for his business interests, but he did not resign as mayor. He still holds the office. The mayor owns Sylva's principal theater.

Best Lighting

Artificial light should resemble sunlight, as much as possible, ample to see to work by but not too glaring. Electric light is probably best because it does not consume oxygen from the air of the room, nor does it give out to the air any waste products. Light should not fall directly on the eyes, but should come from the side or behind the shoulder.

Church Pew Space

The minimum spacing for church pews back to back is 30 inches—32 or even 33 inches to be preferred. A space of 18 inches in the length of the pew is considered a sitting. The actual seating capacity can be determined only by drawing the seats to an accurate scale on the floor plan and then measuring the linear feet of the pews. For approximate values six or seven square feet may be allowed for each seat.

German Telephone Device

A scientific magazine reports that in Germany a number of telephones have been equipped with typewriter devices whereby anyone who rings up a friend and finds that he is not at home can rap out a message on a keyboard attached to the telephone, the message being transferred to a paper tape on the friend's desk.

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Woman Pledges War on Crime If Elected Sheriff

DENVER (AP)—Mrs. Lena V. Alley, mother of seven children and grandmother of three, who is a candidate for sheriff of Kit Carson county, Colorado, promises to clear that county of organized gangs of bootleggers and thieves if she is elected.

Mrs. Alley, 42, is opposed for the Republican nomination by four men. There are five men in the field for the Democratic nomination. The primary election is in September.

"I don't think I'll have any more trouble than a man," she said when asked if she anticipated trouble with the lawless elements. "I was raised on firearms and I can shoot pretty straight—about as straight as any sheriff in the country."
