That the plaintiff's mortgage given to secure said note as heretofore described be decreed to be a first and prior lien over all other liens or encumbrances and that the said sums of money above set forth be decreed to be a good, valid and subsisting lien upon the said premises under and by virtue of said mortgage, upon all of the property heretofore described and as described in plaintiff's mortgage, to-wit:

Lot nine (9) of Lyman's Sub-division of Lots two (2), three (3), four (4), and seven (7) of Cogran's second (2nd) Addition to the City of La Grande, County of Union, State of Oregon, and that the said mortgage be foreclosed, and that the property thereon described be sold as provided by law; that the plaintiff may be a purchaser at said sale; that the proceeds of the said sale of the said property be applied to the payment of the amounts due the plaintiff and to become due upon the promissory note heretofore described, reasonable attorney fees and costs and disbursements of this suit, and accruing costs, and the balance, if any, to be paid to the subsequent mortgagee, or her successors in interest, and if the proceeds of the said sale are not sufficient to pay the said sums so due the plaintiff, and to become due as

Goodbrod and Georgianna Goodbrod, his wife, and Ada F. Schweigler, may have or claim to have in or to or upon said premises or any part thereof, and that all of the defendants, and each of them, and all persons or parties claiming

under them, or any of them, may be forever enjoined and debarred from asserting any claim whatsoever in any to said land and premises adverse to plaintiff, and for such other and further relief as to the Court may seem just and equitable.
