"I quit the fellers because they don't agree. Follow the Lindbergh telephone wire and you will find the baby and the three fellers. The fellers were pretty nervous.
"If I did not like the baby I would not write this secret. These fellers have a radio and read plenty newspapers. If you catch the fellers and the baby will you let me go free."
The letter was signed simply "thank you" and bore no name. It was printed with pencil. The paper was blue-lined and of a cheap grade. The letter was postmarked Buffalo, N. Y., March 10 at 6:30 a. m. The printing was similar to that on a postcard mailed from Newark a day or so after the kidnaping.

The West Construction company of Portland. It calls for grading 7.65 miles and pavement widening of 7.01 miles of the Brooks-Salem section of the highway.
Bridge Award Withheld
The third large item was for construction of a bridge over the Santiam river on the Pacific highway near Jefferson. The Clackamas Construction company and Liasch & Tatt were low at \$102,660. The award was held back for approval by the federal road bureau. The Santiam bridge will have a 24-foot roadway. The present bridge is only 16 feet wide.
Umatilla county was allowed \$17,000 for money it had advanced the state in unemployment labor some time ago. The Lake county court lost in its effort to have the state credit it for \$20,000 worth of road work the county is said to have done, without being allowed to have it apply on future contracts there.
Other awards included: Construction of 27 miles of bituminous macadam of the Newport-Eddyville section of the Corvallis-Newport highway, and 4 miles of oil surface treatment on Newport-Lane county line section of Oregon Coast highway, all in Lincoln county, J. C. Compton, McMinville, \$24,578.
Construction of 1218 feet of concrete pavement in the Elk creek tunnel on the Umpqua highway west

of Drain, Odum & Durette, Salem, \$5,924.
Offering project No. 10, involving construction of 5 miles of road mix surface treatment on Terrebonne-Redmond section of The Dalles-California highway, and 11 miles of oil surface treatment on Mitchell-Dayville section of Ocooco highway, J. F. Forbes, Olympia, \$42,595.
Pending the decision of the Josephine county court, the award on the low bid for bituminous macadam project No. 11, involving construction of 30 miles of macadam and 5 miles of oil surface treatment in the vicinity of Grants Pass, Drain, Bandon and Denmark, was held up.
Among the projects to be advertised June 9 were: Scottsburg-Paradise creek, surfacing 11 miles with federal aid; Tangent-Snedd, pavement widening 3 miles, federal aid; Reedsport-Scottsburg, three bridges, federal aid; Otis-Siletz river, oiling 12 miles, federal aid; Klamath Falls-Terminal City, paving 3 miles, federal aid.
