

NEW PARIS CABINET INHERITS COMPLEX PROBLEM

Other Powers Oppose France On All Fronts

PARIS (AP) — Knotty problems, left over by the old chamber of deputies and the expiring government of Andre Tardieu, will confront France's new cabinet and lower house when they "take over" early in June.

There is grief, ahead for the incoming premier, whoever he may be, Edouard Herriot, as leader of the largest party in the chamber, probably will draw the first invitation to form a cabinet.

Foreign relations form a pretty puzzle in themselves, but it is the domestic situation that is likely to give the new administration its first headache. A glance at that explains in a large measure the talk of a "transitional" cabinet, to hold office until the new chamber gets its bearings.

There is, at the top of the list, a budget deficit. It is estimated at from two to nine billion francs, which translate into American money at from \$80,000,000 to \$360,000,000.

Must Step Warily

Balancing this involves, among other factors, a decrease in the cost of government, and lowering the salaries of public employees is just as ticklish an affair here as in other republics.

Another tender subject is the social insurance law, the French combination of unemployment dole, workmen's compensation and old age pensions. Enemies of this statute are making revisions to reduce the state's contributions, a measure which would not exactly appeal to wage earners.

Foreign affairs can be approached only by a path containing the deadly spiral of possible isolation of France. On all sides the republic finds itself confronted with these which, on their face, seem diametrically opposed to French ideas.

Powers Oppose France

At Lausanne on June 18, the French delegates to the reparations parity must meet demands of Germany, Italy and Great Britain for complete cancellation of reparations. The new legislature must wrestle with a possible change in the French policy relative to the war debt owed to the United States.

Linked with this big question, is the situation at the disarmament conference in Geneva. There has developed an almost united front against the French proposal for an international army. There is also on the Italian demand for naval parity.

The parliament may be called upon to fit this opposition into the time-honored French thesis of "security before disarmament."

France is also combating a German-Austrian-Hungarian-Italian-Turkish coalition which is driving for a revision of the treaty of Versailles. But in opposing this she has the aid of her war-born allies, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Jugoslavia and expanded Rumania.

U. S. Trade Dispute

Finally there are questions of trade relations with the United States, Canada, Argentina and several European countries arising out of the quota import system originated by the Laval government last fall.

ROME (AP) — Over two million boys and girls under 18 now wear the black insignia of fascism.

A widespread movement to expand Mussolini's training machine added 727,533 to the junior organizations last year.

The organizations are the Balilla, for boys up to 14, Avanguardisti, for boys between 14 and 18; Piccoli Italiani, for girls to 14, and Giovani Italiane, for girls from 14 to 18.

Physical training is organized for the groups as part of the duce's campaign to build a robust generation.

The boys are given primary military instruction with the opportunity of graduating into the "Young Fascists of Combat," the fascist militia.

Rosner, Bullwinkle Conquer Venze

NEW YORK, May 20 (AP) — Gene Venze, invincible during the winter season, already has found a conqueror outdoors.

The Pottstown, Pa., schoolboy, who ran the mile in 4:10 this winter, finished third in a special 1000 yard run at the New York curb exchange track and field meet last night.

Both Otto Rosner, former Princeton star, and George Bullwinkle of the New York A. C. led Venze to the tape. Rosner ran the distance in 2:13 2-5, only a fifth of a second off the American record set by Larry Crown in 1921.

Battalino, Petrolle To Battle Tonight

CHICAGO, May 20 (AP) — Episode two of Billy Petrolle's and Bat Battalino's blood and thunder fight show will be presented in the Chicago stadium tonight.

This pair of rough Italian boys staged episode one in Madison Square Garden last winter, Petrolle winning by a technical knockout in the twelfth and last round. Tonight's showing is billed for ten rounds, and both have made the usual prediction that the bout will not go the limit.

Petrolle was a 7 to 5 and 8 to 5 choice.

LOMSKI, SLOW, IS BEATEN BY GEO. GILSTRAP

SPOKANE, Wash., May 20 (AP) — Leo Lomski, once the feared Aberdeen Assassin who slaughtered every light heavyweight from the bottom to a couple of notches from the top, bowed to George Gilstrap, of St. Maries, Idaho, a willing but inexperienced lumberjack, here last night.

Lacking the shifty footwork and the terrific punch that led him to the threshold of the championship several times, Lomski plodded through the six rounds, hardly landing a solid blow. The decision was unopposed, but the fans who booed it said the old Lomski could have stopped Gilstrap in the first round. Lomski weighed 160 pounds, and Gilstrap four pounds less.

Norman Wilson, 158, of Portland, defeated Johnnie Walker, 156, of Spokane in six rounds, and Roy Ackley, 140, of Portland, drew with Mickey Trad, 142, of Spokane, in other bouts.

\$10,000 Damages Sought in Suit

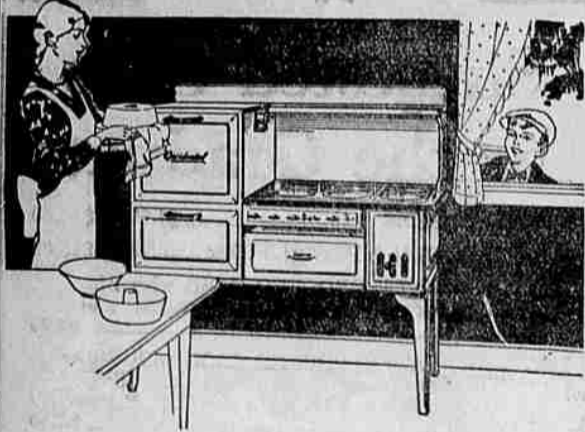
