Then, 72 days after the kidnaping, Col. H. Norman Schwarzkopf summoned newspapermen to the garage on the Lindbergh estate. There, with doors locked, telephones silenced, so that none might give premature announcement to an eager world, Col. Schwarzkopf read the formal police statement announcing that the baby's body had been found by William Allen, a negro, in a gully on Mount Rose hill, near Mount Rose, N. J., approximately four and one-half miles from the Lindbergh estate.
