Cutting of Cube Butter Prices Is Predicted

PORTLAND, May 21 (AP)—The cutting of cube butter prices on the produce exchange for the weekend session was forecast and generally expected.

With the marks of butter still of huge volume and increasing generally at practically all Pacific northwest points, the trade has been hard put recently to find a suitable outlet; inasmuch as California has been full of butter.

The cut of butterfat buying price to 15c generally for Portland delivery, was automatic with the butter drop.

Price cutting is more or less fairly general in the market for eggs locally although the co-ops continue to name former prices as the selling level. Receipts continue heavy and demand for storage is easier.

Very good demand is continued in the market for live chickens of all sorts with no change in the general price list. Demand remains high the best for the lower priced offerings.

All country killed meats are showing an easier feeling along the wholesale way with, no general change in the price schedule although most of the business is reflected near the bottom price.

There is a better movement of home grown lettuce with resulting better quality of offerings. California stock is in small supply and few traders cared to order more. Prices in locals rule mostly around \$1 top.

Arrivals of peas from The Dalles are increasing. Some extremely fancy stuff was quickly grabbed up at a dime a pound.

Slightly slower trade is suggested in the market for asparagus with little movement at the extreme price. Receipts are not heavy but other vegetables are finding more favor at the moment. Quality is good.

Coming to the almost finished condition of local strawberry supplies, California stock was quickly snapped up and at higher prices. Sales mostly \$1.75 for top 20s.

Recent weakness in new white potatoes has outsided and trade in general is steady to strong with sales around \$2.30 @ \$2.75. Garnets are inclined to hold steady. Old potatoes just steady.

Carload of cantaloupes which arrived for the weekend trade from Imperial valley was of extreme quality and sold well around \$4.75 for standard, \$4 for pony and \$5 for jumbo.

Some very fancy local strawberries sold at \$2.75 crate on the east side farmers' wholesale market. Offerings in general were not liberal. There was a fair supply of Roseburg stock which moved mostly \$2.50 a crate.

Home grown peas are in small supply but of very good quality at 8c lb. Dalles stock is also available at 7c lb. Lettuce trade was about steady with local mostly 80-90c and a few selections as high as \$1 crate.
