HOUSE HAS ENGLISH ANCESTRY An excellent English precedent is followed by this house. It features the use of friendly and inviting gas ends, with the large outside chimney. The plan forms an "ell" shape and may be used as shown or in reverse if so desired. From the entrance hall one can reach the living room, the kitchen, or the dining room. The living room is large, well ventilated, well lighted and has a fine large chimney place. The kitchen lies between dining room and garage, and at kitchen entry also serves as the entry to the garage. Upstairs are three large bedrooms, and a bath that is located over the kitchen plumbing lines. The exterior may be made of local stone and brick, or all brick, with stone trim around windows and doors. A lot 60 x 150 would be suitable. An approximation of cost estimates show the house to run between \$6,000 and \$8,000, depending upon the owner's choice of materials and the labor and material prices of the locality.
