

SENIORS TO RECEIVE DIPLOMAS

128 GRADUATES TO HEAR ADDRESS BY DEAN JEWELL

Commencement Exercises to Take Place Tomorrow Night at the L. D. S. Tabernacle.

One hundred and twenty-eight seniors will be graduated from the La Grande High school to take their places in the worlds of higher education or business, tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock at the L. D. S. tabernacle, Arnold L. Gralapp, principal of the High school, announces. After spending four years between the walls of the High school, they will be presented with diplomas on which will be the proof of their learning, gleaned from High school.

Dean J. R. Jewell, nationally known educator, who has been appointed as head of the combined departments of education of Oregon State college and the University of Oregon, will deliver the commencement address, and Mr. Gralapp feels that La Grande is especially honored by Dean Jewell's visit since he is greatly in demand as a commencement speaker, and is especially busy as the school year draws to an end at Oregon State college where he is now head of the department of education. Dean Jewell has not announced the topic of his address.

Dr. J. L. Ingle, chairman of the board of education in La Grande, will present the diplomas following the commencement address, after which David Stoddard, president of the Union stake of the L. D. S. church, will pronounce the benediction.

Rev. Paul De F. Mortimore, pastor of the Central Church of Christ, will deliver the invocation, and music will be furnished by the La Grande High school music department, under the direction of W. W. Nusbbaum.

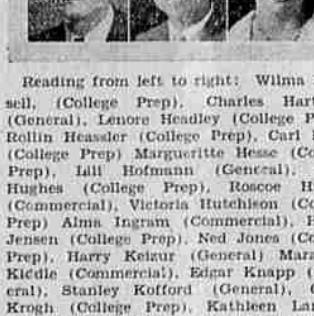

She was cancelling her plans to visit Rome, she said. She will go to Paris for a few days.

U. S. LEADS IN RADIO SETS, WORLD SURVEY REVEALS

GENEVA (Special) — A survey of radio sets in the world by the Union Internationale de Radiodiffusion places the United States in the forefront with 16,679,253 receivers.

The United States, with 133.1 radios per 1,000 persons, ranks second, however, in apparent popularity of receiving sets to Denmark, which had 133.9 sets per 1,000 inhabitants.

The union estimated that the total radio audience in the world numbered 128,000,000 persons and that there are more than 32,000,000 sets in use.
