

Gomez Wins His Seventh Game Of Season Tuesday

Babe Ruth's eleventh homerun in the first inning gave the league leaders an advantage they never relinquished. Wes Ferrell couldn't protect a 6 to 1 lead, and the Chicago White Sox came from the rear to score nine runs in the fifth and seventh frames and defeat Cleveland, 11 to 7.

Loy Goldstein, Detroit rookie, rang up a 6 to 5 victory over the St. Louis Browns, even though he yobbed in the eighth and had to be relieved. Washington and Boston were not scheduled.

The Boston Braves dropped a 3 to 3 victory to Brooklyn but clung to their narrow hold on the National league top when the runner-up Chicago Cubs bowed to St. Louis, 8 to 6.

Tight pitching by Van Mungo, Dodger recruit, and Hack Wilson's homerun in the first inning with two on base caused the Braves' downfall. The Cubs lost largely because of their pitchers could not check Jimmy Collins, who smacked two homeruns and a single.

Martin Defeats Bernard Darwin In Second Round

MURFIELD, Scotland, May 25 (AP)—David Martin, California amateur golf champion, today won his second round match in the British amateur championship, defeating Bernard Darwin, the English golf writer, two and one. Martin defeated L. G. Crawley, 1931 English native champion, in the first round yesterday.

Martin won the second and third hole and was always in front after the fifth, finishing the first nine in 37 strokes, one under par with a one hole lead.

The American got two fine shots to the green to take the tenth and became two up, but he three-putted the twelfth to lose. He won the 13th, largely through a fine iron to the green when Darwin was bunkered from the tee.

Martin had a bad time at the 14th, first pulling his tee shot then laying himself a half stymie and finally missing a yard putt for a half. He won the 15th when he holed a long putt to again go two up and halved the sixteenth without incident.

He just escaped a bunker with his tee shot at the 17th but was forced to halve the hole and end the match. Charles Sweeney, Oxford student, defeated W. W. Sharpe, of England, three and one, to make it three Americans in the third round. His brother Robert advanced to the third round yesterday.

Martin meets H. Shaw, of Temple, in a third round match this afternoon.
