Burleigh Grimes admitted from the witness chair only three days ago that he was just about "washed up" as a big league pitcher, but he would have never gotten away with it had the St. Louis Cardinals been sitting in judgment.

SEATTLE, May 26 (AP)—When the track and field teams of the six schools of the northern division Pacific Coast conference meet here tomorrow and Saturday in their annual championships in conjunction this year with the Pacific Northwest Olympic trials, the University of Washington Huskies will be favored to retain their title.

On the basis of the best performances this year, the Huskies are figured to win over Washington State college, 46-1-3 to 40-2-3. The University of Oregon is given third place with 37, Oregon State college fourth with 19, Idaho fifth with 11, and Montana last with 7.

In a dual meet here a few weeks ago, Washington nosed out the Washington State Cougars, 65 to 60, the mile relay deciding the issue.

The conference schools will be represented by 18 men or less with 24 unattached entries listed from junior-colleges, high schools and athletic clubs for competition in the Olympic trials.
