## Food Allowance For State Men Cut to \$1.65

SALEM, June 2 (AP)—The maximum for meals of traveling state officials and employees were further reduced by the state board of control in session here Wednesday upon a resolution presented by Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer. The previous maximum of \$2 a day, set several months ago in the same manner, was cut to \$1.65.

The resolution as presented by Holman further provided that the sum a day could not be distributed at will, but it placed a maximum on each meal, as follows: breakfast 40 cents, lunch 50 cents and dinner 75 cents. The maximum on hotel room was set at \$2 per night, a reduction from \$2.50 previously set.

The resolution was presented following consideration of expense accounts of various state employees which were returned for investigation by the state treasurer before he would sign them as member of the board. Governor Julius L. Meier voted with Holman while Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, did not vote.

Hoss did not protest the daily maximum, but did protest the maximum for each meal, declaring the state was "attempting to regulate a man's diet," denying him the privilege of reverting the order of his larger meals.

## W. C. Hawley Spent \$1646.32 But Lost The Nomination

SALEM, June 2 (AP)—W. C. Hawley, defeated candidate for re-election as representative in congress from the first district, filed his expense account with the secretary of state Wednesday as totaling \$1646.32, the largest primary expense account yet filed. The item was entered as the amount spent by the Hawley-for-congress committee of which Ronald C. Glover of Salem, was secretary.

A sum of \$557.29 was spent in the campaign to nominate Robert N. Stanfield United States senator on the Republican ticket, according to expense items filed. Of this amount Stanfield spent \$410.73 and Seneca Pouts, of Portland, spent \$137.56. Frederick Steiwer's campaign totaled \$375.52 as listed the Steiwer-for-Senator club and H. J. Warner.

Marshall N. Dana, who also ran for nomination as United States senator on the Democratic ticket, spent \$270.19, his statement showed, while Hal E. Hoss, who won the Republican nomination for secretary of state, spent \$319.96 on his campaign. Ray H. Wiscarver, unopposed for the Democratic nomination for secretary of state, spent \$15.75 on his campaign.

The Oregon Hop Growers association spent \$314.70 in behalf of Robert N. Stanfield and other candidates. H. A. Cornoyer, secretary of the association, reported in his statement. The American Federation of Veterans spent \$309.14 in behalf of "certain candidates."

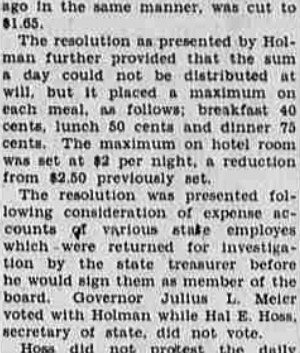

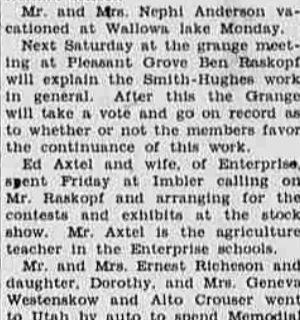
## MRS. KOEBER, 78, BURNED FATALLY

she found the house full of smoke and her mother missing.

On the basement floor was a pile of ashes, the remains of Mrs. Koerber's clothing. In a corner she was crouched, badly burned, and the stick, to which a piece of rag was attached, jammed in her mouth which was lacerated and torn. The woman was rushed to a hospital but was unable to speak, so bad was her condition. She died two hours later.

At first it was believed Mrs. Koerber had set her clothing afire while attempting to light a fire. The suicide theory then entered the cast, and the question of foul play was next considered. The presence of the stick in the woman's mouth puzzled police more than any other angle of the mysterious affair.
