

# Angels Massacre Seals 15 to 3; Beavers Nose Out Oakland

## SENATORS BLAST INDIAN HURLERS FOR 19-2 VICTORY

League Leading Hollywood Team Manages to Stay in Front by Trouncing Missions 6-5.

The climbing Portland Beavers edged out Oakland 3 to 2 to score their eleventh victory in the last 14 games. The Oaks collected eight hits to the Beavers' six, but Pitcher Roy Jolter had a wobbly eighth inning, issuing three walks, two of which came home on Johnson's long double.

Stung by memory of a 16 to 1 defeat the night before the Angels turned on the Seals last night and administered a 15 to 3 drubbing. With batting eyes improved by a morning practice session, the Angels routed Pitcher Ken Douglas in the first inning under a deluge of six runs. Lee Stine took the box and was hit freely, the southerners getting a total of 21 hits. Ernie Sault of the Seals continued his heavy stick work, driving in all three San Francisco runs.

Stars Win Again  
The league-leading Hollywood Stars beat the tail end Missions at San Francisco in a night encounter, Tom Sheehan pitching his seventh straight victory. The score was 6 to 5. Each pitcher was touched for 12 hits. Mark Koenig, former big leaguer, put aside his infield duties for the day and pitched for the Missions. Sacramento Solons, kicked around quite a bit recently, slipped into high gear and handed Seattle a 19 to 2 pasting. Jimmy DeShong, who recently went to Sacramento from the Philadelphia Athletics, won his first pitching start for the Senators, allowing the Indians only six hits. Sacramento pounded out nine runs in the last inning.

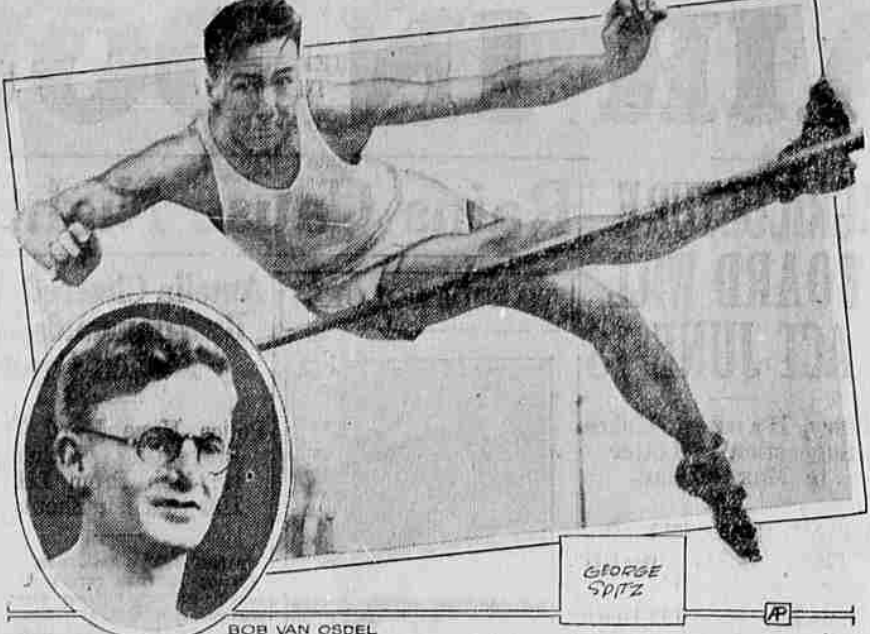

## SPITZ FAVORED FOR HIGH JUMP

American Jumper Goes 6 Feet 8 1/2 Inches in Indoor Meet to Better Record

NEW YORK, June 3 (AP)—Prodigal with legs that seem to have steel springs in their legs, the United States can afford to enter the Olympics without the champion or the world record holder and still be an odds-on favorite to win the running high jump.

Harold Osborn, the Illinois schoolmaster who won the 1924 Olympic title and still holds the world outdoor mark of 6 feet 8 1/2 inches, no longer can keep pace with younger rivals. Good-natured Bob King, the winner at Amsterdam in 1928, is too busy with his medical studies at Northwestern to remain in competition.

Spitz Appears Enough  
Despite these unfortunate developments, the U. S. A. has a phenomenal favorite in George Spitz, lanky New York boy who leaped 6 feet 8 1/2 inches indoors and consistently soared over the cross-bar last winter around 6 feet 7 inches.

There are at least a half dozen others capable of clearing 6-6, which is equal to Osborn's Olympic record. Springing from the California soil that has produced so many exceptional high jumpers, it would not be surprising to see America duplicate her achievement of 1912, when six of the seven jumpers in the final standing were Yankees.  
Only once has this country failed to capture this Olympic specialty. At Athens in 1906 our boys must

## Nowland Listed As Best Bet For Varsity In 1933

The concluding issue of the Oregon Emerald, University of Oregon student daily, under the present staff, included a number of reviews of 1931-32 activities.

In an article discussing the Oregon frosh track team, six yearlings were listed as likely to have little trouble going to the front in varsity competition next year. The six were: Fred Newland, hurdler; Tom Lee and Bob Wagner, distance men; Gardner Frye, weights; Warren DeMars, javelin; and Tom Garrett, pole vaulter.

Nowland, who is a La Grande boy, monopolized the spotlight in the story, which carried his picture in half-column size.  
"Nowland not only is able to do fast time in the high and low hurdles, but has been a leading sprinter for the frosh all year and tops the bar in the high jump close to six feet," the article said. "His best time has been made in the high sticks with a mark of 15.2 seconds."

Incidentally, in making his 15.2 mark, Nowland defeated two varsity hurdlers, Allen and McCoy. In various meets this year, Nowland has usually made high scoring honors and invariably either won or placed in the high and low hurdles and high jump.  
Nowland also was elected honorary captain of the frosh track squad last week.
