

Oregon's Budget To Be Balanced, Hanzen Declares

SALEM, June 3 (AP) — Oregon's state budget for the biennium 1933-34 is going to be balanced, a point where departments and institutional expenses are going to be held strictly within the limit of available revenues, and wherever possible disbursements are to be even less than legislative appropriations.

Such is the announcement today of Henry M. Hanzen, state budget director, who is just now laying the groundwork for a retrenchment program designed to eventually wipe out the \$3,000,000 deficit faced by the state.

In Hanzen's hands lies the authority to prepare the new budget for transmission to the legislature by the governor. Already he has advised all state departments, commissions, institutions and the like to trim all of the frills out of the budget estimates before they are submitted to the budget director. The instructions to them are to trim their sails for the coming biennium to make receipts and disbursements balance and to eliminate everything except strictly essential items of expenditure.

Hanzen, presumably operating in conjunction with and under instructions from Governor Meier, is going even further in his economy retrenchment. He proposes to put into effect by voluntary action of the responsible officials, or through legislative enactment to take several branches of the state government completely off of the shoulders of the taxpayers by making them self-supporting from fees charged for services rendered.

Hanzen was not prepared today to estimate the full amount of the savings which the administration hopes to accomplish by the various economy measures it proposes to put into effect by itself or through legislation to be recommended to the next legislature.

It was indicated that one piece of legislation which will be proposed will assess all state boards and commissions that are self-supporting through fees to contribute a portion of their fees to the general fund in return for the services performed for them at general state expense by the secretary of state, state treasurer, attorney general and other departments which are supported directly by taxation.

Jack Barde Spent \$4780.43 in Primary

SALEM, June 3 (AP) — The campaign to nominate Jack N. Barde as Republican candidate for one of Multnomah county's state senators cost \$4,780.43, statements of pre-primary election campaign expenditures filed with the secretary of state here revealed.

Barde's campaign costs lead the list of funds spent in the campaign, the reports to date reveal. The statement was filed by Sam Davidson, treasurer of the committee of Barde contributors.

James W. Mott's apparently successful campaign for the Republican nomination to congress from the first district rates second in the large expenditures, with a total filed to date of \$3,008.47.

Frederick W. Stelwer filed his expenses in the campaign for United States senate re-election as \$1,095.60. Homer D. Angell's campaign for the Republican nomination to congress from the third district, cost \$1,400. C. C. Hulet, who ran for the Republican nomination for congress from the first district, spent \$1,022. Walter M. Pierce spent \$457.75 in his campaign for the Democratic nomination to congress from the second district.

Hawley Undecided As To a Recount
SALEM, June 3 (AP) — A decision whether or not to demand a recount of votes in the first congressional district will not be made by Congressman W. C. Hawley until the state has announced its official tabulation, Ronald C. Glover, secretary to Hawley here announced. Hawley was trailing James W. Mott in the official count from the 17 counties in the district by about 130 votes, for the Republican nomination to congress.

The secretary of state's office today had votes canvassed in all but three counties in the district, and all but five over the entire state. Clatsop, Clackamas and Washington counties are yet to report from the first district, while Malheur and Multnomah counties have not completed their reports to the secretary's office.

All proceeds of the Western conference outdoor track and field championship meet this spring will be turned over to the Olympic fund.

PARIS (AP)—Frocks which Paris has designed this year for garden parties and outdoor teas have drawn their inspiration from the sophisticated sixties.

Sprigged dainties, candy striped volles and sheer organzies of Maude Muller's day are the fabrics of the mode. A number of them are made with skirts which almost touch the ground finished with the ruffled tiers in vogue sixty years ago.

Big picture hats if milan or leghorn straw, crocheted lace mitts or gloves and abbreviated jackets add to the picture which recalls the sixties, while a demure manner and subdued makeup put the finishing touches to the mode.

One of the glamorous afternoon costumes is made of white muslin sprinkled with tiny blue blossoms. The hat to wear with it is a daisy-like leghorn trimmed with blue velvet ribbons which jacket in short streamers, while its inset is a little elbow sleeved—design of blue velvet.

Presbyterian Flat Deeded to Union County For Park

UNION, Ore., June 3—Presbyterian Flat, a historic spot seven miles up Catherine creek from Union, famous in the old days as the scene of many religious camp meetings, has passed to the ownership of Union county, and will now become a public park, according to the Republican.

Through the efforts of County Commissioner W. W. Stevens and County Engineer S. B. Morgan, a deed to the property from Mr. Collins of the Pontosa Pine Lumber company to the county was obtained last week.

The property comprises 100 acres. It will be cleaned up and improved by installing tables, benches and a fountain. Many young trees will be planted, and a foot bridge across the creek will be built. A monument will be erected with the inscription, "Pioneer Park," by which name Presbyterian Flat will hereafter be known.

When the contemplated improvements are made by the county, this park will become an ideal and popular public playground.

UPSETS OCCUR IN NET PLAY AT AUTEUIL

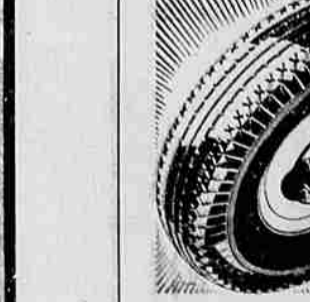
