PROSPECTS FOR KIDDLE

The people of La Grande and Union county were pleased to learn yesterday that State Senator Fred E. Kiddle has excellent prospects for being elected to the presidency of the state senate next term.

This would be a distinct honor for Mr. Kiddle and for the district which he represents, for the presidency of the senate is a highly responsible position. Those who know Mr. Kiddle and his record are sure that he is well qualified for the office and that he has earned such an honor.

The president of the senate presides at all sessions of that body, makes the various committee assignments, and acts as governor of the state in case the governor dies or is absent for any reason. Such responsibilities demand ability. Kiddle has it.

He was born and reared in this vicinity, is well known throughout Eastern Oregon, and has proved himself interested in the welfare of the entire state. Local people appreciate what he has done for them, but his efforts have not been confined to sectional legislation.

The whole state thanks Mr. Kiddle for the work he did in securing the repeal of the one mill property tax for market roads. This relieved real estate of more than a million dollars in taxes without depriving the counties of market road funds, for the burden was shifted to gasoline taxes and auto licenses.

Mr. Kiddle was responsible for the bill that reduced auto license fees two years ago, and also for the law permitting farmers to secure a refund of the tax on gasoline that is used in tractors and farm machinery. He has figured prominently in the legislation in favor of ex-service men, and co-operated with Senator Eberhard in a great deal of school legislation.

Mr. Kiddle is now in the middle of his second term in the state senate, and in his six years of service he has proved himself worthy and competent to assume the duties of president of the senate. That body will do well to elect him as its leader.

SENATOR WHEELER CITES FACTS

Senator H. C. Wheeler came in from Pleasant Hill Tuesday night to sound a warning to the 3000 Lane county residents assembled in the Eugene armory to hear the facts concerning the initiative proposal which, among other costly and destructive acts, would move the University of Oregon to Corvallis to become a part of a new Oregon State university. A veteran of the state legislature, Senator Wheeler knew whereof he spoke. It was not for oratorical effect that he declared that if Lane county allowed the measure to pass it would be only a short time until the state was called upon to separate the institutions again. He had watched progress of higher education legislation for years and his prediction was based on that experience.

Nor was he seeking to arouse partisan feeling when he recalled that not a year had passed without a request from Oregon State Agricultural college for new buildings with the supporting testimony in Lane county but so crowded that it couldn't possibly take care of additional students. Senator Wheeler was merely testifying to actual occurrences that are matters of record. His purpose was not to stir feeling against the college but to get the facts straight in the public mind, correct the false impression that the student body of the university could be moved over to Corvallis and put at class work without the opening of a single carpenter's kit on the college campus. His answering shot of truth was needed, too, for the insidious report that building facilities on the college campus are of ample capacity to house the university student body has been accepted widely over the state.

Senator Wheeler did not need supporting testimony in Lane county but he was given it anyway. Judge Lawrence T. Harris reminded the great audience that President Kerr told the last legislature that housing facilities at the campus were inadequate.

The delegation urged legislation to permit federal loans to cities.
