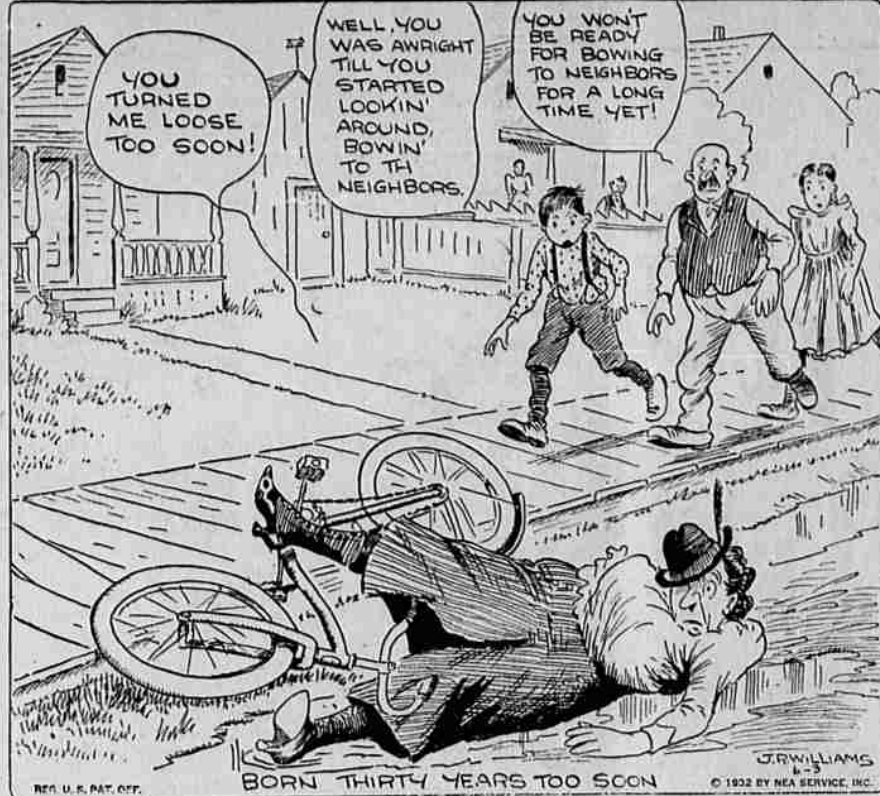

In Washington

WASHINGTON—Speaker John N. Garner employs a very significant gesture whenever he is approached in the capital and questioned concerning his chances of obtaining the Democratic nomination for president at Chicago this month.

He holds up his right hand, index finger extended and shakes it back and forth in front of his face several times.

"That means," he told a group of newspapermen in his office this morning following the somewhat stormy state convention at Houston that gave him 46 votes, "that I have nothing to say on that subject."

What he thinks about it all is a secret that perhaps only he knows.

Consider, for example, that morning after the state Democratic convention at Houston ended, a declaration for resubmission of the prohibition question had been adopted.

TIRES SKY HIGH IN CHILE

EXCESSIVE MODESTY

A girl of 17 who long had been ambitious to become a physical education teacher refused to enter upon the necessary training when she learned that she would have to live in a dormitory with other girls and that it would not be possible for her to dress and undress in privacy.

A psychiatric study of the girl reveals that when she was about three or four years old she loved to run about without clothes. Once she even came prancing out on the front lawn to the consternation of parents and neighbors.

On that occasion she was severely punished by both father and mother. From that time on there was no difficulty about immorality. The child had learned her lesson with absolute thoroughness, but the final result was the excessive modesty which was demonstrated so perfectly in the reason she gave for turning her back upon the career which she cherished.

WORLD RECORDS FALL

STAGG FIELD, Chicago, June 4 (A) — Jimmy Owen, stocky, black haired speedster from Maplewood, Mo., sped to a new national interscholastic record of 9.7 seconds for the 100-yard dash, in the final of the event in the University of Chicago's national prep championship meet.

Sam Allen, of Bristol, Okla., cracked the world prep record for the 120-yard high hurdles in his semifinal heat. The Oklahoma youth flashed over the barriers in 14.9 seconds, a tenth of a second faster than the accepted record set by Teddy Welch, of Pasadena, Cal., in 1927.

It also was two-tenths of a second faster than the meet record set in 1930 by Charlie Casper, of Harlandale, Texas.

Fritz Pollard Jr., son of Brown university's famous all-American football player, won the second semifinal in 15 seconds even, tying the world record and beating the meet record.

The Boy Scouts
