Zorn's Arguments For Initiative Measure Are Held As Extravagant

EUGENE, Ore. (Special)—Judge Lawrence T. Harris, speaking for the integrity committee representing the chambers of commerce of La Grande, Ashland, Monmouth and Eugene, Tuesday answered the arguments advanced by Henry Zorn, president of the Marion County Tax Equalization league, sponsors of an initiative measure calling for a complete change in the set-up of higher education in Oregon.

Many Statements Challenged

Figures Much Exaggerated

Mr. Zorn again quotes figures which greatly exaggerate the amount of floor space available for lecture and laboratory on the Corvallis campus and vastly understates the amount available at Eugene. The correct figures are 205,000 for Corvallis instead of 227,000, and 190,000 for Eugene instead of 87,000. The larger amount of floor space at Corvallis is necessary because of the nature of the work. Laboratory and shop not only require more space per student than lecture room where students are seated in a compact area with no equipment to congest the room, but the laboratory student puts in three hours for each credit earned while the student attends a lecture for a single hour for each credit. The value of medical school plant has not been reckoned into any statement of capital value on the Eugene campus either in the statement issued from Eugene or from the office of the state board. The value of the Eugene plant alone is officially estimated at \$4,500,000.

per cent below the average level of expenditure per student in institutions consolidated from the beginning. Moreover, the entire expense of the Eugene establishment for the next year will be approximately \$1,100,000. Of this amount approximately \$800,000 will come from state funds. The proposed saving from the abolition of the university, therefore, amounts to 125 per cent of state support for the Eugene institution. It is difficult to understand how we are to save more than is being spent from state funds. It is difficult to understand how any saving can be realized in cutting down on instructors when the top of the scale among state universities in the ratio of instructor to student. The principal administrative officers are deans and under the new program of the state board but one dean has been provided for a given school operating major and minor establishments on two campuses. Specific reference to the lack of any need for two chemistry buildings recall the fact that the president of the state college, legislative committees, and the federal survey of higher education repeatedly referred to the need for another chemistry building and other science buildings on the Corvallis campus even without consolidation of the two major units.

Harmony Idea Novel

Mr. Zorn's suggestion for harmony between student bodies is novel. The rivalry between students bodies of institutions in the same state is not confined to Oregon and is not properly characterized as "licking" or "Kilkenny cat fight." Moreover, Mr. Zorn's proposal for a happy solution is, after a bitter campaign to bring students, alumni and townspeople into conflict, to put the warring elements together on the same campus and, like the conclusion of all good romances, "they will live together happily ever after."

Mr. Zorn Objects to Propaganda

While assuring the role of a propagandist and exhorter himself, while resenting the attitude of the state board "in telling the taxpayer what to do," the advocate of this destructive and wasteful measure, and on the basis of no foundation of fact, assumes the right to advise the voter in his own way.
