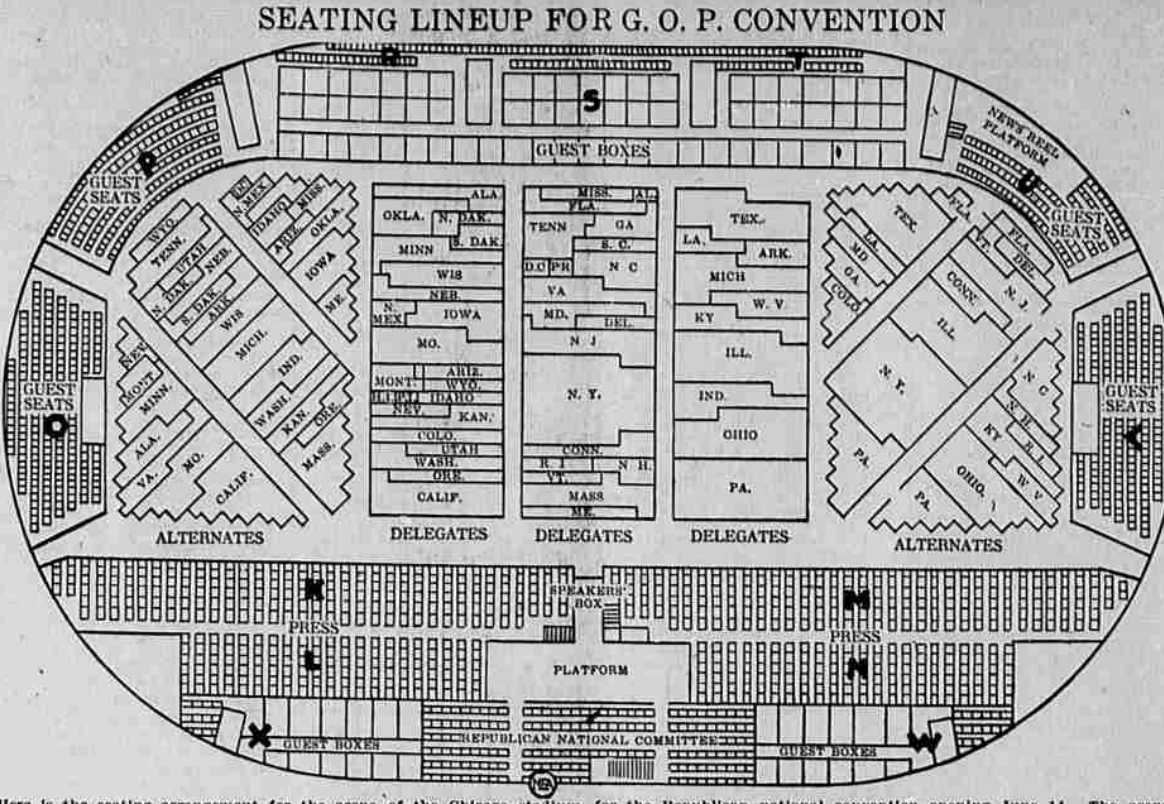

The diagram shows the blocks of seats allotted to state delegates, immediately in front of the speakers' platform, and those for alternates to the left and right. Convention proceedings will be broadcast by amplifiers in Union park to accommodate thousands who will be unable to crowd into the stadium.

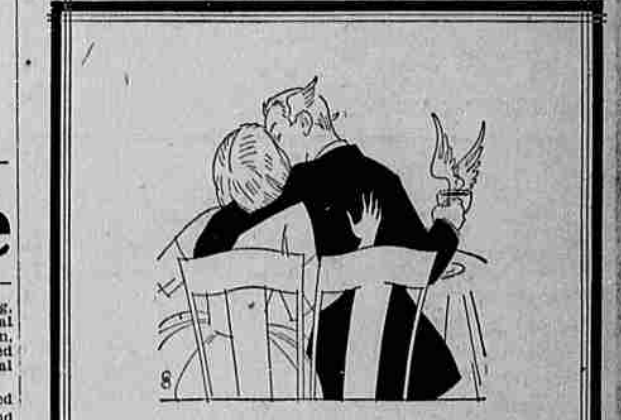

73 SENIORS OF NORMAL SCHOOL ARE GRADUATED. (Continued From Page One) speaker urged them to go to the polls, not as the pawn of the politician but as individuals who have studied and thought. Showing the influence of schools, Mr. Irvine stated that only 31 out of five million persons who have had no schooling have obtained distinction, according to statistics; 850 out of five million who have graduated from an elementary school; 1245 out of two million who have finished high school; and 5768 out of every million who have completed college. The taxpayers are building a bridge of education, and the speaker urged the members of the graduating class to take the education they have placed at the Normal school and go out into the world, remembering that to achieve success a man must gain the respect of men and the love of children. Presents Diplomas. Mr. Oliver, before presenting the diplomas to the students as they marched across the stage, stressed the importance of the early training in the home and of the importance of co-operation between the teachers and the parents.
