

Sarazen Wins British Open With 283 Card

AMERICAN SWEEP UNBROKEN SINCE THE YEAR 1923

Sarazen's Score 13 Strokes Under Par and Sets New Record For Open Championship.

SANDWICH, England, June 10 (AP)—Gene Sarazen, long-hitting American golfer, today won the British open golf championship with a record score to carry on an American golfing sweep in the event, unbroken since 1923.

The 1922 American open champion scored his 283, two strokes under Bobby Jones' winning total of 1927, early in the afternoon and then watched those who had a chance to catch him, fade away under the pressure of having to shoot sub-par golf.

Sarazen has been well up in the British open field for several years, finishing second to Walter Hagen in 1928 for his best effort up to today.

Sarazen scored a 74 on his final 48 holes today for a 72 hole total of 70-80-70-74-283.

H. R. H. a Spectator With the Prince of Wales a spectator for the last five holes, Sarazen scored seven par for the formidable Prince's course. He finished two strokes under the record total of 285 for the British open set at St. Andrews in 1927 by Bobby Jones who scored rounds of 68-71-73-72.

Jones' 68 is record Jones' 68 in the first round of the 1927 even still stands as the record at St. Andrews.

Sarazen gave Prince's such a kicking as it never had suffered before, his four rounds being 13 strokes under "perfect" figures. Arthur Havers, British open title in 1925, was four strokes behind Sarazen starting the final round and never a 70 to tie or a 69 to win. Havers was the last Briton to win the title.

Gene finished out with a birdie four on the last hole, just missing a seven yard putt for an eagle three which would make Havers repeat his 68 of the morning to win.

Gene's final card: 68-71-73-72-283.

Macdonald Smith, Sarazen's fellow American professional, finished out with a fine round of 70 for a 72-hole score of 71-70-71-70-283, five strokes back of Gene.

It was the 11th American win in 12 successive years of the blue ribbon event, the only break being Arthur Havers' victory in 1923, when Hagen finished second.

Havers' Threatens It was Havers who was the threat to Sarazen as he shot a 68 on his third round to pull up within four strokes of the flying American. The Briton faltered on his final nine, however, made the turn in 37 to lose two more strokes to Gene and never started home 4-4-5 his last chance was gone. It appeared the best he could possibly do was a 73, which would leave him three strokes behind.

Sarazen's fine score bettered not only the British record but was three strokes better than the best winning total in the American open, Charles (Chick) Evans' 280 at Minneapolis.

OLYMPIC HOPES

Lord David Burghley's hurdling form, which carried him to an unexpected victory in the 400-meter hurdles at Amsterdam in 1928, will serve him again at Los Angeles, but Lord David will not be an unknown this time. American hurdler's eyes will be watching him closely.

Macdonald Smith, other member of the American "big three" had the heart-breaking experience of scoring a 288 for a total good enough to have won all but the current British championship and the 1927 event. Smith was alone in second place.

First prize in the British open is 100 pounds, about \$300 at the current rate of exchange and not enough even to pay Sarazen's steamer fare but the prestige that goes with the title probably will mean at least \$50,000 to the American professional.

Havers finished with a 70 and a 72-hole total of 289, in third place.

THIS GAME OF GOLF

By O. B. Keeler One of the finest ways of scaring up remarkable scores—versing on the "fresh" class, you might say—is to disseminate such a card through the public prints.

Recently I had an account in this column of an exceptional round by John C. Parker at Moultrie, Ga. Three days after it appeared in an Oklahoma paper I received a letter from Joe S. Creager, of the Conoco Golf club, Ponca City, Okla., enclosing the card of a four ball match which, of low scoring by the quartet, rather, lays in the shade any similar round I ever saw, or heard of.

AN AMAZING SHOWING

Even so the scoring is amazing. The star performer, with a card of 62, was E. J. Rogers, 1931 open champion of Oklahoma. He was paired with Walter Emery, runner-up in the 1931 Oklahoma amateur championship, against Jimmy Schatz and Charles Skolands, 17-year-old high school boys of Ponca City.

The match was an exhibition affair, and it would seem that the lery got all that was coming to it in the way of golfing performance.

ELEVEN BIRDSIES

With his truly remarkable card, including eleven birdies and only one hole above par, Rogers had to be abetted at the last hole by a birdie 3 by his partner, to hold a margin of victory of 1 up.

Victor Burke of Georgetown is the national champion, with a best mark of 83.9 seconds for 400 meters, but he was beaten at the Penn Relays by Eugene Beatty, negro star of Michigan Normal, who set a new carnival record of 53.3.

Out at Los Angeles they are grooming Jimmy Meeks of Occidental college for the Olympics. In his first competitive test Meeks was clocked in the good time of 53.8. Dick Pomeroy of the Los Angeles A. C. has done the trick in 53.5.

Against these homebreds, the foreign contingent, headed by Lord Burghley, also will rely upon Sten Peterson of Sweden and Luigi Facelli of Italy, both point-winners in 1928.

Pettersson has the best mark, 52.4 seconds, but he registered that several years ago and since has had trouble touching 54. Facelli did 53.8 last year.

The Olympic record of 43 flat still stands to the credit of Harry Hillman, Dartmouth's famous coach, who won the event in the 1904 games at St. Louis.

Taylor was clocked in 52.8 in winning the title in 1924, but it was ruled out because he knocked over one hurdle.
