

Children's Day Will Be Observed In La Grande On Sunday

SOME CHURCHES PLAN PROGRAMS FOR YOUNGSTERS

Monthly Junior Illustrated Sermon to be Preached By Pastor at the Baptist Church.

In 1883 the general assembly of the Presbyterian church said "We hereby designate the second Sunday in June as the Children's day on which special services for and in the interest of children shall be held, etc." The Presbyterian church will observe next Sunday in accordance with that proclamation.

A special program has been prepared in which the children will be present and heard, those of the beginning and primary departments being prominent. This program at 9:45 a. m. in the auditorium of the church, will occupy the regular Sunday school hour. Parents and friends of the children are invited. Any one interested in what the church

Remember what Amalek did unto thee—know he met thee by the way and smote the hindmost of thee, even as thou wert come forth from Egypt, when thou wast faint and weary.—Deut. 25:17-18.

The Amalekites were nomadic people, and hunters. They hung on the trail of travelers and caravans, and with treachery, deceit and cunning attacked the weary, weak, and those who fell behind. They did not attack openly, but only when their victims were yielding under their burdens.

Let us, who labor under heavy burdens, know that there are Amalekites in us. Learn how to identify them, and to protect ourselves from them, lest they lay us waste. Things so against us; cares multiply; we see no deliverance; we ask why this distress is upon us, in complaining, waver, Ah, then come depression, gloom, despondency, morbidity. As one gives way to them they wear their channels deeper and broader, and the harder it is to send back the increasing tide. At the very first entrance, reject it. Thereupon later temptations will be milder and more easily expelled.
