Neopolitan Salad, Serving 4

- 2 cups chopped cabbage, 1 cup diced marshmallows, 1/2 cup diced pineapple, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1-3 cup salad dressing, Chill ingredients. Combine and serve on crisp cabbage leaves.

1 tablespoon finely chopped pickles

- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, Mix and chill ingredients. Rhubarb Pie: 2 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2-3 cup lard, 3 tablespoons cold water.

Rhubarb Mixture

- 4 cups diced, peeled rhubarb, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1/2 cup lemon juice, 2 tablespoons water, 3 tablespoons butter. Blend rhubarb, flour, cinnamon and sugar. Pour into pie shell. Add lemon juice and water. Spread with butter and cover with top crust.
