...were amazed to see the figure of a man which seemed to be lashed to the machine.

...We heard a blast on the ship's siren and the figure moved. He waved frantically. We could see now that he was not lashed down.

...Right away I ordered a lifeboat away. It was manned by volunteers under my second officer.

...From the bridge I watched them row away. When they were about 50 feet from the airplane they hailed him and the flier answered in English.

...There was a rough sea running and it was getting worse and we were afraid the airplane might founder at any moment.

...But my men were able to reach it in time to take off the exhausted aviator.

...Almost all of my Chinese crew had gathered at the fall in the excitement to greet the unexpected flier when he was taken aboard.

...It was then 45 minutes after the first sighting and night had fallen. I endeavored to obtain a coherent statement from him as soon as he showed signs of revival, but his exhausted condition made this unfeasible.

...Therefore, he contented ourselves with supplying Hausner with his immediate necessities of water and food. An examination revealed only superficial cuts, bruises and sores, all external injuries and none of them serious.

...At the time of my sending this radio the aviator is progressing splendidly. He did not sustain any serious internal injuries, but continues seemingly incapable of discussing his experiences.

...It was amazingly fortunate we encountered him at the time we did, as by midnight the weather had turned hazy and four hours later a dense fog set in. Even when he was first sighted, the barometer was falling, the sky was overcast and visibility was decreasing.

**CHICAGO STADIUM, June 14 (AP)**

—In the quietest of opening sessions, the Republican convention submerged its troubles for the moment today, but did not forget them.

...As its keynote, Senator Dickinson of Iowa, talked to restless delegates and half-filled galleries about almost everything but prohibition, a group of convention chiefs sped away across town to their hotels to try to heal a new breach over the plank for recommitment.

...A boom for General Charles G. Dawes to replace Vice President Curtis as President Hoover's running mate spread in every direction and a real battle seemed probable.

...When he mentioned the name of Herbert Hoover, there was a momentary burst of cheering. When he ran quickly over the name of Dawes, he aroused some subdued handclapping. Mostly his pronouncements of party principle were scarcely listened to at all.

...The block of passive faces lifted from the debate session testified that the delegates were pre-occupied with other things.

**CHICAGO, June 14 (AP)**—Heading toward a new party deal on prohibition, the Republican national convention assembled today in Chicago stadium prepared to give President Hoover another four-year grant of leadership but bent on a platform proposing that the dry amendment be put on trial for its life.

...As it emerged in the early morning hours from a conference extraordinary of convention chiefs, the compromise plank on the one big convention issue favors submission of a new amendment, giving the states the right to decide for themselves and promising federal cooperation with those that want to be dry. It would not recommend whether such an amendment be ratified or rejected.

...The presumption was that the plank would be acceptable to Mr. Hoover. Several of his own cabinet members were in the all-night conference which drafted it.

...More than a fair prospect appeared that it would be supported by many of the warring wet and dry, although a later floor fight still was threatened by those who want the party to go all the way over to repeal.

...The platform committee, to be named late today under the chairmanship of James R. Garfield of Ohio, still must wrestle with the problem before it goes to the convention at all.

**Egg Decrease Is No Stimulus To Portland Markt**

Portland, June 14 (AP)—The great decrease in storage holdings of eggs throughout the country together with the abnormally slow and depressed trade, creates an abnormal situation throughout the industry. Latest storage holding report issued by the department of agriculture reflects a decrease of 4,023,000 cases in supplies as compared with June 1 a year ago. A month ago the shortage was 2,180,000 cases compared with May 1 a year ago. This month's figures reflect a decrease of 5,001,000 cases as compared with the average for five years.

Despite this serious loss in the current holding of eggs in store, there remains a lack of snap in the market. Locally conditions are far from good. Hot weather offerings are congesting the trade. Poor quality is the rule and this is hard to move.

Trading trend in the market for butter was fully steady for the day. No change was reflected in the price either on the exchange or on the open market. Butterfat values are well maintained.

**Chicken Market Slow**

Very slow trading tone is suggested in the chicken market here even though receipts are not heavy. The weather appears to have put an almost complete stop to the former liberal demand.

Market for fresh salmon is showing extreme weakness and further price loss. Trap offerings from the north together with local fish are keeping the market oversupplied. Halibut is also showing loss.

Practically all known points are contributing to fresh crab offerings on the Portland market. With the closing of the California season this supply of large crabs which usually goes there, is moving to Portland.

Going to the other liberal supplies, the intensity of the season, as well as the low price of competing vegetables, asparagus is inclined to halt somewhat in its consumptive movement. Bales mostly \$1.25 pyramid.

**Heat Hurts Berries**

Quality and price of strawberries has been affected by the extreme hot weather, which has not only forced growth, but has caused much of the fruit to arrive in condition unfit for shipping.

Notes of wholesale trading: Household tomato market remains strong and active.

California tomatoes slowly increasing here with price steady.

Lemons are firmer to higher with a greater movement.

Advance of a dime in sugar is effective Wednesday morning.

Cantaloupes are firm to higher with demand better.

Albert hates and fears his father whom he thinks of as a tyrant. He has as little as possible to do with him. He studies, plays, and has his friends outside his home away from his father's bullying manner and scorching tongue.

Albert likes his mother. She is gentle and kind and does her best to make things easier for him.

And Albert himself? At 18 he is pale, nervous, effeminate lad. He dances well, but trails in the wake of boys with personalities more positive than his own. He attaches himself to his mother's friends who comment on his good manners and considerate, obliging ways.

"The picture is a consistent one. An over-protective father often makes it impossible for his son to emulate him in any way. If the father is a highly successful professional man it is impossible for his son to study.

If the father is athletic and strong his son will have no interest in sports or physical activity. He turns instead to his mother and patterns himself after her. He grows toward a feminine instead of a masculine ideal.

Toward boys he assumes a passive role, furnishing a background and an admiring audience for their more aggressive behavior.

It makes little or no contact with girls of his own age for he is not masculine enough to appeal to them, while he himself unconsciously always seeks someone who will play a mother's part.

This is scarcely a picture of normal adolescence but it is quite typical of the results which such a family situation is likely to produce."
