## One-Run Margins Shown In Speedy Western Baseball

### Los Angeles Uses Eleven Innings to Take Reds-- Bowler and Baecht in Pitching Duel.

Customers at Pacific Coast league ball games yesterday and last night saw some first class playing, each of the three games being won by a one-run margin, two of them going extra innings. The Sacramento-Oakland game was called off because of wet grounds, and will be played Saturday afternoon as part of a double header.

After battling two San Francisco pitchers on even terms all the way, Bollenback, Hollywood moundsman, lost his game 3 to 2 in the thirteenth by walking a pinch hitter with the bases full. The Seals tied the score at one-all in the eighth, and each team scored once in the twelfth. In the thirteenth the Seals filled the bases with a single and two bunts. Los Angeles required eleven innings to nose out the lowly Mission Reds 5 to 4, as Grant Bowler of the Missions and Ed Baecht of the Angels hooked up in a pitching duel. Neither finished the game. Lieber replaced

Bowler in the ninth when the latter grew wild, and Baecht was lifted for a pinch hitter, Herrmann finishing and getting credit for the victory. Brierlytopia Loria Baker gave the Angels the winning punch with an eleventh-inning double after his team mates tied the score with two runs in the ninth.

The largest week day crowd of the season saw Seattle beat Portland 4 to 3. Home runs in the seventh by Pete Scott and Chick Ellsworth put the Indians over the top. After the heavy hitting, Bill Dietrich, Portland pitcher, fanned the next three men.

While the Oaks were idle, Seattle displaced them in fifth place in the club standings by the margin of one percentage point.

## Combs Playing Great Baseball In Old Position

The Yankees, plowing through the west and building up an imposing lead in the American league, owe very little of their success to the costly lot of new talent turned over to Manager Joe McCarthy this spring. Except for the pitching staff, the club that today looks like an even bet to race on unchecked to the pennant is the same that finished second a year ago.

Earl Combs is back at his old outfield post, playing some of the greatest ball of his career.

**MacFayden Wins**  
The Yankees yesterday made it three out of four from Cleveland, 7 to 6, to give Danny MacFayden his first victory in a Yankee uniform. The Indians knocked MacFayden from the hill in the ninth and for the second successive day he had the tying run on third at the final out. A triple steal made it three out of four over Detroit 10 to 5, and kept pace with the leaders as Jimmie Fox propelled his 24th and 25th home runs of the year. As Washington was dropping another to St. Louis, the victory boosted the Mackmen into a tie for second place.

The St. Louis Browns' victory over Washington was their seventh in eight engagements this year. George Blauvelt tamed the Senators most of the way while his mates knocked young Monte Weaver from the box and treated his successors roughly to win 17-3.

**Red Sox Take Chicago**  
The Boston Red Sox beat Ted Lyons, and the Chicago White Sox, 4 to 4, in 11 innings. Al Van Camp's double in the eleventh, followed by a pair of sacrifices, yielded the winning run.

Philadelphia and Cincinnati supplied all the action in the National League by dividing a doubleheader. The Phillies captured the first, 8 to 8, when they got to Owen Carroll for five hits and scored three times after two were out in the ninth, but the Reds came back behind John Ogden's steady pitching to take the nightcap, 5 to 2.

## FINLAND SURE OF JARVINEN AS STAR

### Great Athlete Given Edge Over Yrjola in Decathlon Contest.

## NEW YORK, June 15 (AP)—So far as the records reveal, Akilles Jarvinen, one of Finland's great pair of all-around stars, has no weaknesses. For that good and sufficient reason Jarvinen is favored to turn the tables on his countryman, Paavo Yrjola, and win the Olympic decathlon championship.

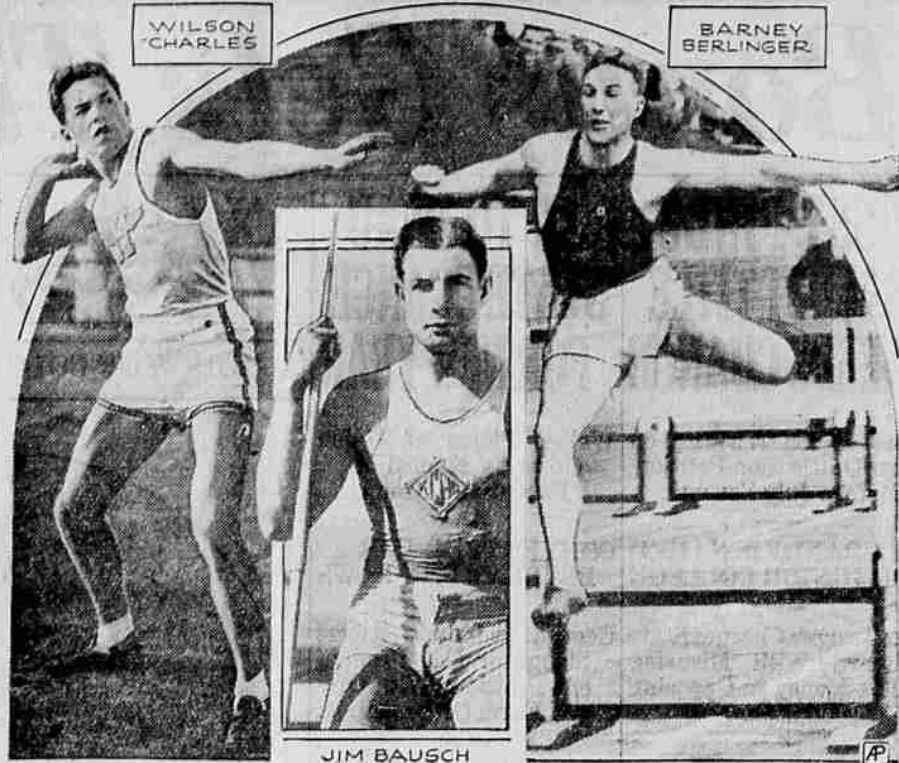
Jarvinen forced Yrjola to set a new world record of 8053.29 points to capture the last Olympic all-around battle at Amsterdam. Since then Akilles' has turned in the brilliant total of 8255.475 points for the ten events.

Finland Looks Certain  
Anything approaching this record figure should be quite enough to carry off the Olympic honors to Finland. Neither the United States nor any other country has anyone likely to take the honors away from Yrjola or Jarvinen.

The best American bet for the all-around tussle, Jess Mortensen of Southern California has been declared ineligible for the Olympics because of his activities as a physical instructor at Riverside, Cal., since leaving S. C. Mortensen, in winning the national championship at Lincoln, last July, surpassed Yrjola's listed world record with a total of 8106.693 points.

On the basis of his sensational improvement within less than a year, Jim Bausch, former star full-

back of the University of Kansas, is the leading U. S. prospect. "Jarving Jim" placed only sixth in the 1931 national championships with 7209 points, but in the Kansas Relays this spring he piled up the fine total of 8023.4025. This represents a gain of 800 points and stamps Bausch as the most im-

proved of all Olympic candidates. The speedy Haskell Indian, Wilson (Buster) Charles, has several times threatened to run up starting point totals, but must improve in the weight events before he can be considered an Olympic threat.

Logical candidates  
He and Barney Berlinger, former "strong boy" of the University of Pennsylvania, both have scored around 7800 points and are the logical athletes to round out the American decathlon trio unless Pim Stewart of Southern California (who placed fourth in the 1928 Olympics), Clyde Cuffman of Kansas or Al LeFebvre of the Los Angeles A. C. pulls a surprise.

The decathlon calls for the fine assortment of talent represented by the 100, 400 and 1500 meter flat races, 110-meter high hurdles, broad jump, high jump, pole vault, shotput, discus throw and javelin throw. It is a track meet all by itself.

Points are tallied on the basis of world records "as of 1912." These are used arbitrarily as standards because no one desired to keep re-adjusting the decathlon table to bring it up to the shifting levels of world record performances. The athlete who equals the basic mark in any event tallies 1000 points.
