Bugs Eat His Dust



One of the first advocates of crop dusting by plane is Lieutenant Henry E. Elliott, shown in inset. Starting in Macon, Ga., in 1923, he estimated that he has dusted more than 500,000 acres of crops since then. Under ordinary conditions 300 acres can be dusted in an hour, he says. It's a rather dangerous occupation, as the plane must fly within 18 inches of the top of the crop to be dusted. 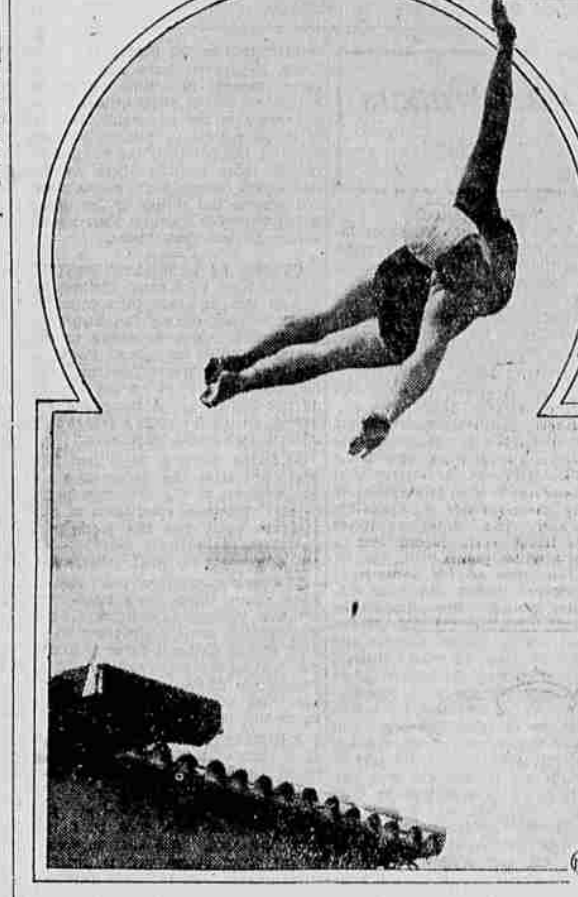
