

Giants Mount To Fourth Position Under Bill Perry

Defeat Chicago Cubs 6-3 On Error From Herman — Boston Drops Game to Pittsburgh.

By Gayle Talbot (Associated Press Sports Writer) Time alone will judge of Bill Perry's ability to handle a big league club, but there is no denying the big first baseman has made an imposing start as major domo of the Giants.

When he took them off John McGraw's tired hands less than two weeks ago, the New Yorkers were running eighth in the National league.

All Terry did after he took charge—for publication, at least—was to abolish the 11:30 "curfew" rule and appoint a new club doctor, but it hasn't looked like the same team.

Today the Giants stood in fourth place, only four games from the top, after winning eight out of ten games under their new foreman. A costly error by Bill Herman, Chicago second baseman, gave the "Terrers" five runs in the eighth inning and a 6 to 3 victory over the Cubs in their opener yesterday.

The defeat did not cut into the Cubs' lead over the field, however, as the second place Boston Braves were dropping a 5 to 2 verdict to Pittsburgh, largely the result of Tony Pie's triple with two on in the eighth.

Floyd Hayes Herman had a happy homecoming at Ebbets field as the Cincinnati Reds trimmed Brooklyn, 5 to 1. The Bebe hit a homerun, a triple and a double and drove in three runs against his former mates. Reliable Red Lucas yielded seven hits in winning his eighth victory. The Phillies took a shortened contest from the Cardinals, 7 to 4, rain stopping play in the seventh inning.

The American league's three top teams encountered defeat at the hands of western rivals. The Yankees dropped a close one to the Chicago White Sox, 2 to 1. Lou Gehrig's 14th

homerun averted a shutout for the leaders.

Earl Webb, playing his first game in a Detroit uniform, teamed up with Gerald Walker to defeat Washington, 7 to 6. Each bagged two doubles, and between them they scored three runs and batted in five.

The St. Louis Browns shaded the Athletics, 4 to 3, when they scored twice in the ninth.

Cleveland made it a clean sweep by the Boston Red Sox, 2 to 3, for his twelfth triumph.

Sharkey Fight With Schmeling Hard To Dope

Nell (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, June 16 (AP)—The faintest glimmer in the fortunes of war, one tiny error of judgment or marksmanship, can turn the heavyweight championship to Jack Sharkey Tuesday night after seven long years of seeking, or leave Max Schmeling without another serious title contender in sight.

Smart man of the ring have come away from the gladiators' training camps shaking their heads.

Probably no two warriors in modern ring history have shown as brilliant play as the dark brown, smiling German, and the massive, determined Sharkey in their training campaigns this week.

Sharkey, the usually blustering, bellicose, erratic sailor, and Schmeling, Europe's lone heavyweight champion, have come down toward the close of their training campaigns in the best condition either ever has attained for battle.

Sharkey, more faithful than ever before in training, apparently has capitalized fully for the first time all the extraordinary punching and boxing endurance he has cast aside at least three times in the past when chances at the heavyweight championship were in his grasp.

He is pounds heavier, yet at 202 the weight has lodged in his shoulders, where it adds to the power of his punches.

Most impressive of all is his mental attitude.

"I'm going to fight," he said today, his eyes level and earnest, "the coldest, calmest, deadliest fight of my life. I'm not going to miss this time."

Elich suffered from severe cuts over the eyes which bled profusely during the match.

Bob Kruse and Ivan Vakturoff, heavyweights, went to a draw, each taking a fall in five rounds.

Henry Jones won from Harold Herbert with a series of whiplocks.

'Dizzy' Dean Says Cardinals Ain't Done Him Right

PHILADELPHIA, June 15 (AP)—Jerome Herman Dean, better known as "Dizzy" Dean, has left the St. Louis Cardinals.

Dean caught a train for St. Louis early yesterday, declaring he was through with the world champions because they had not "treated" him right.

Dean, one of the most eccentric pitchers in the major leagues, has kept the St. Louis club on tenterhooks dealing with his pranks all season. Several times before he had threatened to quit.

It was learned Dean felt he had not received favors he desired from the Cardinals and left the city "in a huff."

"Dean has no real grievances against the Cardinals," Manager Gabby Street said. "He has been treated fairly but he is a hard proposition to handle."

This is Dean's first season as a big leaguer. He has not been the sensation it was predicted he would become.

Dean in St. Louis recently announced he wanted to be traded by St. Louis because he was not permitted to work regularly enough.

On one of the days during the Phila series there, Dean refused to get in uniform because he was not allowed to pitch, according to Phillies' players.
