

Stars Lose Four Straight To Seals

Hollywood Lead Weakened Again By San Francisco

Portland on Heavy End of Scoring With Seattle—Seven Pitchers Sent in to Stop Heavy Hitting.

The Hollywood Stars were balanced precariously on top of the Coast league heap today, with the San Francisco Seals growing at their heels, only a game and a half behind. Last night the Seals took their fourth straight game from the southerners, 6 to 2. In the 40 innings played by the two teams this week Hollywood has scored only four runs.

Ortman, Hollywood southpaw, allowed the Seals 13 hits, while McDonald, pitching for the home town, was reached for 9 safeties. Bob Meusel, Hollywood left fielder, aided the Seals by falling to reach a fly from Donovan's bat in the sixth, and letting a hit by Galan go for a double instead of a single, as well as dropping a fly.

Ory of base hits Seattle and Portland batters indulged in an orgy of base hits, Portland getting 16 and Seattle 15, the final score being 9 to 6 in favor of the Heavers. Seven pitchers went to the firing line trying to stop the heavy hitting. Portland using four and the Indians three. The Ducks hit the Seattle moundmen for seven runs in the first three innings. Jim Peterson lasted in the box for Portland until the eighth inning, and got credit for the victory.

After losing two straight to Oakland, the Sacramento Senators pounded out 16 hits to take a game 11 to 6. In the fifth inning Eddie Bryan, pitching for the Bolons, had a 7 to 1 lead, but was taken out in the seventh when the Oaks threatened. De Shong stepped in when the Oaks had two men on base and fanned two batters to retire the side. He held the Aces to one hit the rest of the game.

Halling in the ninth inning to score one run, Los Angeles beat the Missions 6 to 5, to take a 2 to 1 lead in the series. The winning run was made without the aid of a hit. Jimmie Foxx Has Shining Record So Far This Season

NEW YORK, June 18 (AP)—Were it not for Jimmie Foxx, the major leagues could be neatly separated this season, the National as the slugger circuit and the American as the pitching league. But Foxx's all-around clouting prevents such a classification.

This week Foxx has held the league lead in batting, scoring hits, home runs and runs batted in, losing only his 10th record in triples, up to today's slugging and 23 homers. Four weeks ago he had driven in 71 walks. Babe Ruth was not far behind with 21 homers and 62 runs batted in. The totals for the National league leaders were 17 homers by Chuck Klein and 60 runs batted in by Don Hurst, both of the Phillies. Foxx's other first place marks were his 376 batting average, 41 runs and 82 hits and here as well as in the other slugging sections, the National league was ahead. Klein had 66 runs and 89 hits and Hurst had hit safety 34 times. Paul Waner of Pittsburgh, National league leader, had a batting average of .300. Klein's other homers came from 10 triples, 28 runs batted in and eight stolen bases, all good for second place in his league.

Other slugging leaders were Paul Waner with 51 doubles, Red Wrenchington, Boston Braves with 27, and Charley Oelshlager of Detroit with 18. Babe Herman, Cincinnati, 11 triples and Brockton, Washington, 10. In base stealing, Ben Campbell of the New York Yankees gave the American league the lead. He had pilfered ten against nine for Frank Frisch of the St. Louis Cardinals.

The American league had a distinct edge in pitching. Three pitchers in the junior circuit had won 12 games apiece while the National league leader, Steve Swenson of Pittsburgh, was credited with seven victories and one defeat. Vernon Odom of New York and Bob Cowley of Philadelphia, set the American league pace. Odom had won one game and Cowley three against 10 losses apiece. One French of Cleveland also had won 12 games.

Five Chicago boys were regulars on the University of Washington freshman football squad last fall. Bruce Nix, now pitching make-up of the Knoxville Southern league baseball team, once scored from second on a sacrifice bunt record last.

Jack Sharkey Is Said Tough Job For The Referee

NEW YORK, June 18 (AP)—Storm signals can be hoisted for the benefit of the man who referees the 15-round heavyweight championship bout between Max Schmeling and Jack Sharkey next Tuesday night.

Challenger Jack has an embarrassing habit of putting referees "on the spot" in almost all his crucial engagements. Drama, comic and otherwise, follows the Boston sailor wherever he goes. In fact he manufactures it in wholesale quantities. Recall a few of his more important bouts. There was that match with Jack Dempsey when Sharkey turned his head long enough to claim a foul and long enough for Dempsey to put over a knockout punch; the match with Phil Scott in the southland in which the Briton was counted out while claiming he had been "hit" low; Sharkey Can Weep. Then there was that famous battle with Jack Delaney when the rusted "raper of the north" went down and out with one punch while a hysterical Sharkey wept tears of excitement in one corner of the ring; the bout with the huge Italian, Primo Carnera, in which Sharkey thumped Primo with one punch and then tried to jump out of the ring when the referee refused to heed his demand that Primo be disqualified for going down a second time without being hit.

And finally there was his first match with Schmeling, two years ago, when he fouled the German into the doctor's heavyweight title arena giving him a terrific beating for nearly four rounds. There will be no winning on a foul on Tuesday for the New York state athletic commission does not permit a fight to be stopped for that reason, but the referee, whoever he may be, will need to keep his wits about him.

Prices Cut
Faced with the possibility of a tremendous financial "flop," the Garden acted yesterday to avert complete disaster. Dramatic reductions in whole sections of high priced seats in the new Garden bowl on Long Island increased the number of \$2 and \$5 tickets to about 50,000. Only 17,000 seats of the grand total of 17,000 were left in the top brackets. This revision of prices meant that a gross of \$300,000 was the best the Garden could realize even should the fight be a sell-out. Prospects are for a "gate" of only about half that amount.

Will Sharkey Revenge Battle Lost To Schmeling, June 21?

NEW YORK (AP)—Max Schmeling stepped out of the ring at the Yankee stadium two years ago, the new heavyweight champion—with a face that looked as though someone had been battering it with soft rubber hose.

Down the opposite steps stalked Jack Sharkey, without a mark on him, but officially beaten by a low left hook he thudded into the German's groin in the fourth round. That foul ended an one-sided four rounds as ever opened a heavyweight title contest. Grim and alert, the Boston sailor jabbed Schmeling's face with lefts, hooked his head, crossed his right. He swept the German before him, landing at will, taking but one solid right hand to the head in the four rounds.



PERCY BEARD
The man who, without the aid of a favoring wind or starting block, has stepped the 120-yard high hurdles faster than any of his contemporaries, is Percy Beard, above, former Alabama Poly star who will shortly launch his campaign to win a place on the American Olympic team. Beard is the holder of the official American record of 14.2 seconds for the high stakes, which is one-fifth of a second under the accepted world mark. He will represent the New York A. C. during the Olympic trials.

But the mental edge is all with the challenger. Schmeling remembers punishment. Sharkey still rages at the injustice of losing a fight to a man who showed nothing but ability to stand up under a beating. In that mental state he is a tremendous fighter. One or the other will need heavy applications of arnica Wednesday morning.

Bob Quinn, who deserves a better baseball fate than he has been handed with the misfortunes of the Red Sox this spring, is willing to sell out.

"But I won't give the club away even if I have to hang on to it indefinitely. I'm heartily sick of getting a lot of nasty letters from fans round about the city of Boston."

Quinn and Shano Collins, after lifting the Red Sox to sixth place in the American league last year, were well this year. But they experienced one setback after another, starting with the violent death of Ed Morris, star right-handed pitcher and a \$50,000 asset.

The Sox are in the worst spot in the league from a competitive viewpoint. All they have to do for the first two months is play about 70 per cent of their games against the A's, Yanks and Senators, the three strongest teams in the league. This kind of medicine is enough to break the spirit of any outfit.

Babe Ruth's return to Boston as a part-owner and manager of the Red Sox undoubtedly would help revive some of the old spirit and interest, but right now this seems a Utopian suggestion. The Babe is worth more to the Yankees than the Red Sox can afford to pay out, for one thing, on top of which it would be necessary to rebuild the whole Boston lineup, at another substantial outlay, to get anywhere.

Ruth alone could not haul the Sox out of the depths.
