Elephant Fossils Found Near Rome

ROME (AP) - Workmen digging a few yards from the ancient Roman colosseum excavated the remains of a beast that inhabited the site probably 25,000 years before Roman civilization.

They found part of the head, a molar tooth and a tusk nine feet long of an "elephas antiquus," the giant forerunner of the present elephant family of Africa and India.

The find was made only eight feet under the paving level of the aged old and now ruined Roman Temple of Peace. The remains, now fossilized, were taken to a museum.

Manchu General "Probably Dead"

TOKYO, June 23 (AP) - General Ma Chuan-shan, hop-skip-and-jump Manchurian military impresario, was reported "probably dead" again today.

Press dispatches from Harbin said Japanese aviators bombed and destroyed a little hamlet of five houses, 50 miles southwest of Harbin, where General Ma had set up headquarters for his campaign against the Pu-Yi government.

If the general was at home, they said, he almost certainly was killed.

Alabama Coach Has Big League Prospect

CLEVELAND (AP) - Stewart Aiken, of the University of Alabama, is the most recent Crisp-coached ball player to go up to the major leagues for a trial.

The 22-year-old second baseman has been signed by Manager Billy Evans of the Cleveland Indians. Coached by Hank Crisp at Alabama, Aiken joins other stars who had their teaching from Crisp, including Luke and Joe Sewell and Riggs Stephenson.
