UMATILLA FOREST FIRE HAZARDS ARE SLIGHT AT PRESENT

Throughout the entire year the following offenses are violations: Building a camp fire in grass, leaves, rotten wood, or other dangerous places, or in windy weather, without clearing around the fire pit and confining the fire to a hole.

Leaving any fire unattended or failing to totally extinguish a fire before leaving it. Throwing or placing lighted cigars, pipe, beer, match, firecracker or other burning substance, or discharging fireworks, in any place where they may start a fire.

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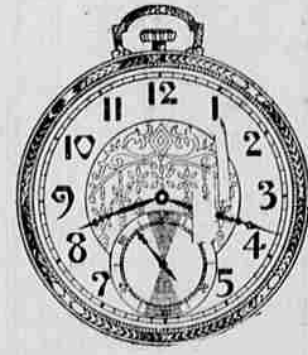
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
