A LOSING FIGHT

In a letter to Henry Zorn, president of the Marion county taxpayer's league which is one of the sponsors of the proposed measure which would move the University of Oregon, the normal schools, the law school, and establish a teachers college and two junior colleges, Governor Julius L. Meier yesterday expressed himself in definite opposition to the bill because of his firm belief that it would "not be conducive to savings to the taxpayers but on the contrary would result in large economic losses."

Just a few days previously the Oregon Voter, recognized authority on state tax matters, had carried an article (written by C. C. Chapman, we presume) which carefully analyzed the claims of the backers of the school-moving bill. The conclusion reached is that the claim of \$1,000,000 yearly saving by such a measure is grossly exaggerated; that as a tax-saving measure the initiative bill can accomplish nothing without further legislation which would necessarily be destructive; that as a reorganization measure it provides a set-up which would be, if successful, as powerful a claimant upon the taxpayers as the existing institutions have been or can be; and that the measure and the promises made in its behalf will not stand up as an economy measure under the test of factual analysis.

Almost every daily newspaper in the state has carried editorials pointing out weaknesses in the proposed legislation, and expressing opposition to the plan — even those papers located in cities which might derive some benefit if such a scheme were carried out. In fact, newspaper opposition has been so strong that Henry Zorn wildly asserted that the state press had been bought by the university, which is absurd to say the least, and only serves to make the public suspect that the backers of the bill are hiding some selfish motive behind their eagerness to save the taxpayers a million dollars a year, especially since Zorn refuses to reveal the identity of the men who are putting up the money for his campaign, and threatens to oppose Governor Meier's entire tax reduction program unless he approves the school-moving initiative bill.

The very first reaction of most La Grande citizens to the proposal of the Marion county organization was one of opposition, as expressed in this column nearly a month ago. Eastern Oregon had to fight for years in order to get its normal school, and naturally opposes any scheme which would abolish it now. Even though it were changed into a junior college, the city would lose the Ackerman Training school and be forced almost immediately to build a new grade school building to take care of the children which now attend there. So the measure would be the direct cause of an increase in local taxes in La Grande, an increase which would far more than offset any reduction effected by the state-wide reorganization.

But, granting that we might be prejudiced in the matter, we refrained from further comment and carefully studied the claims and promises of the Marion county group. (If there is any way of improving the efficiency and prestige of our state educational system by reducing the cost nearly fifty per cent, three or four scattered communities should not be allowed to stand in the way.) However, the inevitable conclusion is that the school-moving bill would fall far short of saving enough money to offset the harm it would do.

There will probably be \$2,000,000 available for higher education in Oregon next year, according to Mr. Chapman's figures, under the present system. The Marion league claims that the bill would save half of that amount; which would mean that the state would have to operate a greatly enlarged university at Corvallis, a large teachers college at Eugene, the law school at Salem, Downbecher hospital and university extension, and the medical school at Portland, and junior colleges at La Grande and Ashland, all at a cost less than that of operating the present state college alone. Impossible! Moreover, even though the state were able to save \$1,000,000 a year, it would be saved at the expense of the students. Seventy per cent of the students of both schools are totally or partially self-supporting, depending upon odd jobs during vacations and through the school year. Corvallis is not nearly large enough to provide odd jobs for the combined student bodies of the two institutions, and hundreds of students would thus be forced out of the opportunity for education.

The proposed measure will not save the taxpayers any

money, it will not make it easier for our young people to get an education. Whom would it benefit? Mr. Zorn refuses to say; it might prove embarrassing.

Gardner Cowles Sr., Des Moines publisher for appointment as a director of the reconstruction corporation was voted unanimously by the senate banking committee.

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—President Hoover today signed an act authorizing the secretary of the interior to reclassify all lands of the Klamath irrigation district and place in the temporarily unproductive class such lands as he determines to be properly subject to that classification.

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—At the request of President Hoover, Henry J. Allen, former senator from Kansas, today agreed to furnish publicity for the Republican presidential campaign.

After a conference with the president, Allen said principal publicity headquarters would be established in Chicago and branch offices in Washington and New York.

He indicated James L. West, publisher of the national committee, will head the activities in Washington. Allen will take over his post at once.

The Kansas was director of publicity for Mr. Hoover in 1928. Shortly after the election of Charles Curtis to the vice presidency, Allen was appointed to succeed him as senator from Kansas, but was defeated the following year by Senator McClure, a Democrat.

Since that time he has served with the St. Lawrence river commission and as assistant to Charles G. Dawes, former president of the reconstruction finance corporation.

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—It was said authoritatively today that President Hoover has an intention of appointing a president to head the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. President Hoover's authority to name a president of the corporation was challenged in the senate today by Senator Robinson, Democratic leader.

This came after the senate banking committee had reported unanimously on the appointment of Gardner Cowles Sr., Des Moines publisher, to be a director of the corporation.

Helen Moody Has Easy Match In Wimbledon Play

WIMBLEDON, England, June 24 (AP)—Mrs. Helen Wills Moody, seeking her fifth Wimbledon tennis singles title, advanced to the quarter-final round today with an easy 6-3, 8-6 victory over Mrs. Kitty McKane Godfrey of England. Mrs. Moody has not lost a set in her parade through the field.

Clara Jacobs, America's second ranking woman player, today advanced to the last eight of the English tennis championships with a 6-1, 6-4 victory over Mrs. C. E. Jameson of England in the fourth round.

Betty Nuthall, one of England's leading women players and a former American champion, defeated Sarah Palfrey of the United States 6-1, 6-2 in the quarter-finals.

The Nuthall-Palfrey match was played on the center court before a gallery of 12,000. The American was the loser of the highest and best time battle against an opponent who was just a bit more successful in critical spots.
