## MANY MOVIE STARS DUE AT LIBERTY

Lil Dagover, Famous In Germany, Will Play In Movie Here.

Doug Fairbanks Jr., Lil Dagover and William Powell who form a triad of stars not to be sneezed at, illuminate the Liberty theatre's new weekly calendar announced this morning by Manager Jack Wright.

The glamor that surrounds all foreign stars who trek to Hollywood seems to have fallen liberally about dark-haired Dagover. That she was the original nun in Max Reinhardt's production of "The Miracle" in Germany contributed chiefly to her fame. "The Woman from Monte Carlo" is her American debut.

The stock of Doug Fairbanks Jr. leaped upward with his picture, "Union Depot" which was in La Grande not so long ago, and William Powell's stock went up a long time ago and it appears, is never going to come down.

"Love is a Racket" Doug Fairbanks appears to splendid advantage in this fact-paced story of modern life and activity in the metropolis. He has a chance again to handle both drama and comedy in this amusing play. He is a young columnist and he falls in love with a beautiful chorus girl, played by Frances Dee, whose aunt is ambitious for her to marry a millionaire. The aunt doesn't like the newspaper man and the resulting entanglements produce good comedy and drama. Ann Dvorak, Lee Tracy, Lyle Talbot, Warren Hymer and Andre Luguet are also in the cast.

"The Woman from Monte Carlo" The story in which the match-made initial appearance concerns Lottie Corliss, a captive butterfly who longed for the safety of her past in Monte Carlo. ### ROOSEVELT SURE OF WALSH

CHICAGO, June 25 (AP) — Confidence in the Roosevelt forces would muster 850 votes to elect Senator Walsh, of Montana permanent chairman of the Democratic convention and to abrogate the two-thirds rule was expressed today by James A. Farley, leader of the New York governor's supporters.

A majority of the convention is 578 votes. The Montanan, choice of the Roosevelt forces for permanent chairman of the convention, was asked if he would fight for that job. "I'm in the fight now," Walsh said.

The white-haired leader of the Democratic forces in the senate arrived alone on the Capitol Limited and after posing on the train steps for half a dozen photographs went to his headquarters in the Blackstone hotel.

Another arrival on the first section of the same train was Joseph P. Tumulty, who was President Wilson's secretary. Tumulty said he favored retaining the two-thirds rule and would give his reasons in a formal statement later in the day.

Senator Gore, of Oklahoma, a delegate from his state to the convention, also arrived.

Attacks Hoover Claim Speaker Garner at his daily conference with newspaper men said: "We loan the shipping interests many millions of dollars at very low rate of interest and it's all right; when we try to do something for all the people it's 'pork barrel.' "I think he is wrong," he continued. "It would be very much resented by the authors of the bills and an impractical thing to do. It would be difficult to the point of impossible to get the bill in the shape the president asks."

Not Wasteful Wagner said the program of public construction, which the president so vigorously attacked, was "not wasteful, but the essence of prudent economy."

"If it sounds economy to build that which we need when costs are low," he said, "and costs are low indeed today. It is sound economy to put men to work instead of maintaining them in idleness as we are doing today in every city of the United States."

Wagner charged the president was not candid when he stated the public works program would give employment to an average of less than 100,000 men.

CHICAGO, June 25 (AP) — Senator Harrison of Mississippi, who proposed yesterday that the rules and chairmanship dispute be compromised, suggested today the Democrat rules committee recommend abrogation of the two-thirds rule in the event of a convention deadlock.

Governor Harry H. Woodring of Kansas today presented to party members a proposed platform plank which would commit the party to payment of the soldiers' bonus, to unemployed World War veterans only, in a series of monthly installments.

He said this plank, if adopted would relieve Washington of its concentration of veterans.

Dudley Doolittle, national committeeman from Kansas, advocated a plank favoring amendment of the farm loan act to permit financing of farm mortgages at a low rate of interest "to prevent the complete breakdown of agriculture."

Blaming recent troubles in Hawaii on the creators of the territory and not the Hawaiian people, L. L. McCandless, urged a plank, continuing to the people of Hawaii, the traditional territorial government accorded to all territories of the United States since the beginning of our government and that the officials appointed to administer the government of Hawaii shall be qualified bona fide residents.

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farmers, merchants, laborers and others are unable at this time to pay their full year's license fee required on their motor vehicles. ## Price on Peas Up As Demand Grows

PORTLAND, June 25 (AP) — There is a keen demand for peas and prices are showing an upward swing after recently touching a new low mark. The latter has appeared in the field and are taking everything in sight and at prices that are around 3 1/2c for ground stock and 3 1/4c lb. for pole offerings. Recently sales on the open market have been as low as 2c lb. with a general 3c top.

Now market prices have advanced to as high as 6c with occasional sales of selected stock 5 1/2c lb. The sharp advance is due to the sudden appearance of the canners in the market just at the time when everyone thought they had quit.

New pea crop is just coming on in local sections and the advances will be welcomed by growers generally.

Shipping demand has been good during recent days but the volume of sales has been held back by the temporary scarcity of the telephone variety.

## Butter Prices Not Changed Despite Supply Increase

Chicken Weakness Believed Subsiding; Demand For Veal Favorable and Mutton Improves.

PORTLAND, June 25 (AP) — Lack of price change in the butter trade appears due mostly to continuance of the efforts of speculative interests to protect their storage supplies.

Increasing make of butter continues a big surprise along the Pacific slope.

During the weekend session of the produce exchange there was no change in the price list for cubes and a similar condition was reflected on the open market for both prints and cubes.

Butterfat values are at least steady. Trading in the egg market showed generally improved sentiment with late price advances more easily maintained. Here and there some difficulty is shown in maintaining values with underselling by producers to dispose of their supplies direct to retailers.

The late weakness in the market for spring chickens appears to be subsiding somewhat. In fact some of the leaders of the trade suggest that a shortage will soon be shown with betterment in prices.

Rather favorable demand for lamb is showing along the wholesale way for country killed offerings with some slight improvement for mutton.

While prices continue low, the movement of tomatoes has been considerably aided by the sharply lower prices lately forced. The big movement from hot-houses is said to be nearly over. The Dalles is shipping a slightly great amount of hot-house with next week's movement scheduled to be heavier.

Some improvement was noted in the weekend demand for strawberries and a slight rise in price resulted. Raspberries were in better call and even loganberries have started to show some movement.

There is a scarcity of quality head lettuce at the moment with prices steady to firm for the best available. In fact all lettuce is finding an improved call.
