THE INSULT TRAGEDY

More than half a century ago Samuel Inault came to America from England, eager to seek his fortune in this young and rapidly developing nation.

His progress was almost dazzling. He organized an industrial and financial empire which grew by leaps and bounds, extending its power into every corner of the country, acquiring new plants and developing new enterprises.

Inault became the very epitome of those typical, early American industrialists who got in on the ground floor and profited from the seemingly boundless expansion of the nation.

But now Samuel Inault is going back to England, 73 years old and bankrupt. All of his properties have gone into receivership.

The nation apparently is entering upon a new era. We have outgrown the exuberant hurly-burly of youth and are beginning to settle down into a saner, steadier maturity.

Dr. P. K. Whelpton, of the Scripps Foundation for Research in Population Problems, has been studying the latest census figures. He finds that we are approaching a period of declining population.

Those facts clearly show our declining birth rate, and with immigration restricted to almost nothing it seems fairly certain that within a few years our population will not only stop growing, but will begin to decline, very slightly but nevertheless perceptibly.

It appears that the great boom is about over, and that we may now level out and develop the many cultural, social, and spiritual phases of our national life—which have been too long neglected for the sake of material wealth and progress.
