

### Rivalry Between Fighters' Camps Gaining Momentum

RENO, Nev., June 30 (AP)—Smouldering rivalry between the training camps of California's Max Baer and Chicago's King Levinsky was fanned to the verge of a "free-for-all" here last night as Seal Harris, massive Chicago negro, pounded out a ten-round decision over Kenneth Lee of Oakland, Cal., and then kept right on pounding.

Police rushed into the ring, a gun was flashed in the big negro's face and a water bottle was crashed over his head before he was convinced the fight was over.

Nevada's number one fight fan, Governor Fred B. Balzar, joined the rush of spectators into the ring and had one leg over the ropes as the near riot was brought to a halt.

Harris, 235-pound sparring partner for Max Baer in the latter's training for his battle with Levinsky July 4, continued to whang away at his opponent after the final bell. Lee, 190 pounds, had put up a courageous and vicious battle but was outmatched in six of the ten rounds. He is a Levinsky sparring mate.

### Measures Changing Postal Rates Are Signed by Hoover

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—Changes in postal rates, estimated to bring additional revenues of \$10,000,000 annually were approved Wednesday by President Hoover.

He signed three bills, one of them estimated to net about \$7,000,000 by fixing the rate of postage on publications for delivery to a point within the same postage district in which the business offices of the publishers are located.

The second bill fixed the fees and limits of indemnity for domestic registered mail and the third prescribes the fees and limits of the indemnities for domestic insured and collect-on-delivery mail of third and fourth classes.

### Russians Will Take Up Baseball

MOBSCOW (AP)—Baseball will be introduced to the masses in the Soviet Union as soon as the necessary equipment and instruction can be obtained. It has been announced by officials of the physical culture society.

The society, which controls Soviet sports, made the announcement after investigating the game on the recommendation of Americans in the foreign workers' club.

Plans already are under way in the organization of teams in Moscow.

He has entered the national event before, but was not able to make a real showing. He has held the Alabama and Southern intercollegiate titles.

Perry won the Southern amateur first in 1929 but did not defend it in 1930, preferring to enter the national intercollegiate tournament that year.

### Chats With Parents

#### PARENTAL MISTAKES

During recent years so much has been written of how mistaken have been our past methods of dealing with children that conscientious fathers and mothers may well be suffering unduly from a sense of guilt. Certainly it is true that happiness and success in later years depend upon the experiences of childhood and that these experiences largely are the product of parental attitude and decisions. It is a heavy responsibility and

our mistakes cannot help but weigh upon us. Certainly most of us come to the task of parenthood less wise, less mature, less fit in every way than we should be. It is a thing which cannot be remedied, only modified by good will and intelligent effort. We must all expect to make our percentage of mistakes. The sooner we recognize them the sooner we can counteract them. It is well for every parent honestly to criticize his behavior in the light of all that he knows and all that he can possibly learn, but it does no good to develop a morbid conscience. A parent who feels that he has not given his child a fair deal in the past and who tries in an unhappy, emotional way to make good the wrong he has done is not apt to improve matters. Righting our errors requires an effort loving and conscientious but also controlled and intelligent. A mother who comes to the realization that she has been playing favorites among her children will not make matters better by suddenly becoming demonstrative to the neglected one, for he, no doubt, already is on the defensive. It will take tact and understanding as well as a wise use of casual opportunities to win the confidence he needs to feel in her love.
