AUSTRALIAN 'SECRET SIX' TO FIGHT BRIBERY SYSTEM

SYDNEY (AP)—Business men here, with a secret inner council of six of Australia's leading citizens, have, at the instance of the Rotary organization, formed an Anti-Bribery and Secret Commissions Protection League.

For some years bribery has been increasing. Business men found they had to pay "commissions" and give "presents" mostly to politicians, to obtain big orders and contracts. The inner council will lay traps for bribers and arrange for immediate prosecution.

Portland Man Is Burned Seriously

PORTLAND, Ore., July 1 (AP)—John Armstrong, 50, was burned seriously and two others were overcome by smoke in a rooming house fire here early today.

Firemen found Armstrong lying unconscious in a hallway. He suffered first degree burns to his hands, arms, face, neck and back. The two who were overcome by smoke recovered rapidly.

Portland Building Shows Big Decrease

PORTLAND, Ore., July 1 (AP)—June building permits issued here totaled only \$157,586 as compared with \$593,405 in June 1931.

Total valuation of permits issued during the first six months of this year, however, is \$3,823,800 as against \$3,500,410 for the same period last year.

National Electric Power Co. Bankrupt

NEW YORK, July 1 (AP)—An involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed in federal court today against the National Electric Power company, a \$900,000,000 insular concern.

Robinson Replies To The President's Words of Criticism

WASHINGTON, July 1 (AP)—Replying to President Hoover's expressed disappointment at the savings effected by the national economy bill, Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, Democratic leader, said in the senate Thursday that the chief executive has failed to comply with a senate resolution asking him for specific economy recommendations.

"I think we all feel a measure of disappointment that greater economies have not been obtained," Robinson said. "But I want the country to know the chief executive has not only had full opportunity to make definite suggestions, but has been invited to do so by the senate of the United States, but has made no recommendation and contents himself with the declaration that he is disappointed."

Recalling that the resolution, which he sponsored, was adopted June 14, Robinson said the president has had "ample opportunity to supply the information and make the suggestions the resolution called for, but has totally failed to give any recognition to it."

HUNGARIAN NAZI FORMING

HITLER FORCE IN BUDAPEST
BUDAPEST (AP)—Zoltan Mesko, announced in parliament that he was introducing Hitlerism to Hungary.

Expressing his dissatisfaction with policies which he said had brought Hungary to the verge of ruin, Mesko said he was forming a national socialist party.

The new organization is called the Hungarian national socialist farmers and workers party. It plans close co-operation with the Hitlerites of Austria and Germany.

BISHOP CANNON TURNS HIS BACK

present at the convention would meet right after it is over, and lay plans for a thoroughly representative conference.

Bishop Cannon, lashing out at the southern delegates who went along in the roll call for repeal, charged them with "a double betrayal," in permitting without protest adoption of the demand on congress to submit repeal, and in sitting "dumbly" impotently or indifferently while the convention "actually voted that members of the Democratic party including their dry southern constituents, must support the repeal of the 18th amendment."

He said the "stinging rebuke of 1928" should have been enough but now "if southern Democracy is not to be hopelessly permanently disin-

tegrated, the moral forces of the south must find expression under another leadership which will not betray them as in 1928 and 1932."

He blamed the Democratic action upon "hand-picked" political leaders upon the "always disreputable, benighted" Tammany and similar elements.

If W. C. T. U. members attend a purported third party convention of dry at Indianapolis July 4 they will be present as individuals, not as representatives of the W. C. T. U., said Mrs. Ella A. Boole, president of the National W. C. T. U.

"The women of the W. C. T. U. will decide for themselves as to what political action they will take," said Mrs. Boole, "and this will be done at our national convention in Seattle Aug. 12-19."

"These two conventions have been politicians' conventions. Now will come the action of the home loving women, millions of whom abhor the attempt to restore the liquor traffic. The attempt to make it appear that women want repeal of prohibition is ridiculous. The party opening the door to liquor is doomed."
