

Churches To Observe Independence Day

Sermons To Be Of Patriotic Nature Sunday

Many Interesting Programs Announced By Ministers; Russian to be at Nazarene Church.

Independence day and the thoughts it brings to mind will rule most of the churches of La Grande on Sunday, July 3. Several of the ministers today announce patriotic sermon subjects for their morning services.

The announcements follow:

Presbyterian Church (Sixth and Washington)
The signers of the Declaration of Independence were great because they were both patriotic and brave. The citizens of this country are great, and make the country great, because they are patriotic and brave. We too must believe and dare to stand for the principle that the government is for the people; their safety, prosperity and happiness," says Rev. J. George Walk, minister who will speak Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, on "The Birthday of Our Rights." "There are great things to think about today," said the minister in making these announcements.

Miss Edris Maguire, organist, will play the prelude "Naestoso" by Mac Powell, and the offertory "Chacondu Solo" by Becker. There will be other special music arranged for by the music committee.

Sunday Bible school is at 9:45 a. m. and Christian Endeavor at 6:30 p. m.

Church of the Nazarene (Y avenue at Birch street)
An Independence day sermon also

will be preached at the Church of the Nazarene by Rev. Daniel L. Swartz, the pastor. His subject will be "Our Country" and the sermon will be given during the 11 a. m. worship hour.

Sunday school at 9:45 will begin the day's services, with the school starting a new questionnaire method.

At 6:45 p. m. the N. Y. P. S. will meet. The "Go-get-'em" side is leading the "Rustlers" by about 250 points, with the former in charge of the meeting this week. A special service of song is announced.

Mr. Swartz will speak on the theme "Freedom" at the 7:30 service.

Choir and orchestra practice will be held Tuesday evening.

Rev. Jacob A. Coue, a native of Russia, will be at the Nazarene church Thursday evening and will speak of conditions in Russia at the present.

St. Peter's Church (Episcopal) (Fourth street and O avenue)
The services at St. Peter's church on Sunday, July 3, will consist of Holy communion at 8:00 o'clock, church school at 9:45 and Holy communion and sermon at 11:00 o'clock. At the 11:00 o'clock service observance will be made of Independence day.

Everyone is cordially invited to attend these services.

First Church of Christ, Scientist (First and Washington)
"God" will be the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, July 3. The Golden Text will be "I am the Lord thy God, which have brought thee out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage. Thou shalt have no other gods before me" (Ex. 20:2, 3).

Among the citations which comprise the Lesson-Sermon will be the following from the Bible: "Am I a God at hand, saith the Lord, and not a God afar off? . . . Do not I fill heaven and earth? saith the Lord" (Jer. 23:23, 24).

The Lesson-Sermon also will in-

At the 11:00 o'clock service the pastor, Rev. Edwin W. Bracher, will speak on the subject, "Ally to God." The choir, accompanied by Helen Jensen, will sing the anthem, "O Come, Let Us Sing," by Herbert J. Lacey. A hearty invitation to participate in this service of worship is extended to all who may desire to come.

THE PRESENCE OF ANGELS

There is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner that repenteth.—Luke 5:10.

If "There is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner that repenteth, then the angels are in close contact with us, they are concerned in what we do, their joy is affected by our acts, and their very life is associated with our life. They are of course interested in mass movements, but they are also minutely concerned, for they rejoice over one sinner that repenteth. LEMON CAKE PIE
(A Popular Dessert)
Menu For Dinner
Creamed Salmon Buttered Potatoes

Carrot and Pineapple Salad
Salad Dressing
Lemon Cake Pie Dessert Coffee

Carrot and Pineapple Salad
(A crisp salad serving 6)
1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture
1 1/2 cups boiling water
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup chopped pineapple
1 cup grated raw carrots
2 tablespoons chopped pimientos
Four water over gelatin mixture. Stir until dissolved. Cool. Add rest of ingredients. Pour into mold rinsed out of cold water. Set in cold place to stiffen. Unmold on lettuce and top with salad dressing.

Salad Dressing
(For fruit or vegetable salads)
4 egg yolks
1/2 cup sugar
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/2 teaspoon mustard (dry)
2-3 cup vinegar
2-3 cup water
2 tablespoons butter
Beat yolks and add dry ingredients. Mix well and add rest of ingredients. Cook in double boiler until dressing is thick and creamy. Stir frequently. Cool and store in ice box.

Lemon Cake Pie Dessert
1 unbaked pie shell
3 tablespoons butter
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 eggs, beaten
1 cup milk
3 tablespoons lemon juice
1 tablespoon grated lemon rind
Cream butter and sugar. Add flour and salt. Add eggs, milk, lemon juice and rind. Mix well and pour into pie shell. Bake 35 minutes in moderately slow oven. Cool and serve.
Whipped cream can be spread over the top of the pie when served, if desired.

Relief Map To Be Shown in Portland

WALLOWA, Ore., July 1 (Special)
—A relief map, built true to scale has been constructed by County Clerk Reavis with the assistance of others in the court house. The map, four feet long by two and half feet in width, shows in minute detail the location of the various peaks, lakes and streams in that section of Wallowa's mountains commonly called the Switzerland of America. It takes in the section including Wallowa Lake and over into Baker county, and including a portion of Idaho on the east to a part of Union county on the west, says the clerk.

This project will be displayed this summer in Portland — at the Union Pacific Company office, in the Public Service Building and at the Imperial Hotel. At the latter place it will be on display during the American Legion convention this fall.

From this map detailed plans for a trip may be made and thorough understanding of what to expect when reaching the high mountains of this county may be obtained.

HEAD, HEART AND STOMACH
The head, the heart and the stomach are the three great "centers" of complaint.

Though the patient may complain specifically of head aches, or of pains in the heart region, or of gastric disturbances, it does not necessarily follow that the pathology, or that which is wrong with the person, really affects the organ or system to which the pain is referred.

The head, the stomach or the heart may be merely the spout of

the funnel through which pour forth complaints, warranted or unwarranted, conscious or otherwise, which the total personality of the patient suffers.

It is for this reason that in the treatment of such complaints the physician may be obliged to concentrate on some seemingly remote part of the body.

He may not even treat the body directly, but rather seek a remedy in the adjustment of environment, work and personal relations, which are the real source of the patient's trouble.

A good deal is known in medicine about this type of complaint. Thus, it is known that loss of appetite, constipation or diarrhea may be the result of emotional disturbances.

Homesickness in humans, as was witnessed on a large scale among recruits in the war army, frequently gave rise to gastric disturbances. Depression often is responsible for constipation. Colitis in an acute diarrheal form or in a chronic mucous form frequently has behind it factors of a definite emotional character.

Individuals so affected are commonly of the so-called sensitive type, suffering from a great deal of self-concern and self-analysis. Vomiting frequently is the result of an emotional and nervous disturbance, and vomiting in fancied pregnancy may serve as an illustration in point.

All of the foregoing reflects, therefore, upon the problems which the physician faces when called upon to treat this type of patient.
