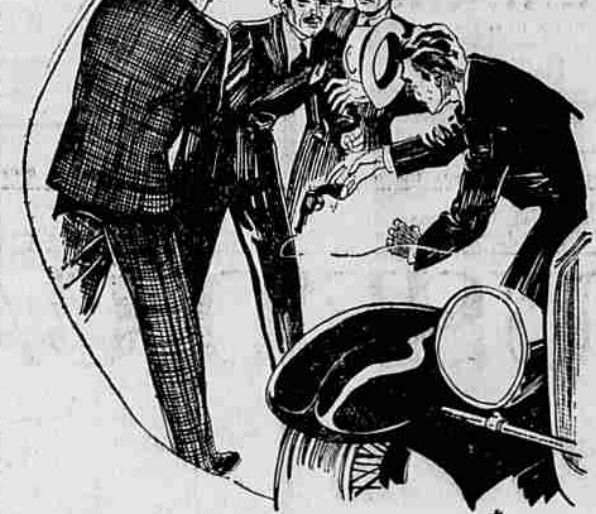
WOOL REPORT BOSTON, July 1 (AP) - The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "The broader interest in wool, noted a week ago, continues. There are indications, moreover, that this interest is likely to expand after the holiday. Just how intensive the demand will be on account of belated buying for the heavyweight season remains to be seen, but there is no doubt that business is now in the making on a bigger scale than for months, both in woollens and worsteds." "Wool prices are hardly changed for the week, whether in the west or the east. There has been some little readjustment downward on medium combed and woolen wools. The movement of the new clip continues moderately from the west, mostly on consignment." "With the present extremely low prices for wool clothing, the piece-goods markets would seem to be in a position to do a decently good business for the fall and winter season."

Gambler's Throw by Eustace L. Adams

Huge headlines across the front pages proclaimed that the kidnapers had descended upon Chicago the evening before and had been spectacularly successful. Ronald P. Williams, multi-millionaire grain broker, had been seized at the door of his luxurious home in Evanston. H. P. Martin, wealthy real-estate operator, had disappeared while going from his office in the Tower building to attend a private dinner at the Illinois athletic club, only a few blocks away. The notorious gang leader, One-shot Lucel, was getting out of his armor-plated limousine at the door of a Wilson avenue night club when he had fallen into the net of the kidnapers.

In only one case had there been bloodshed. One-shot Lucel had been accompanied, as usual, by two armed and alert bodyguards. According to the reports of eye-witnesses, the bodyguards had shot first. Their fire had been returned by a stream of flame from a machine gun. By the time the spectators had nerve themselves to approach, the gangster's chauffeur was the only living participant remaining at the scene. The two bodyguards were dead, their bodies riddled with slugs. One-shot had disappeared. It was quite apparent that the kid-

Ex-Kaiser's Son Rumored Ready To Take Power By Walter Brockmann BERLIN (AP) - With the government in the hands of avowed rightists most of whom are aristocrats, and Hitler's Nazis expressing their approval, the ghost of Hohenzollernism again stalks the German stage.

The peremptory dissolution of the reichstag, rumors of an impending change in the republican constitution and of the appointment of a commissioner with dictatorial powers over Prussia, make Republicans apprehensive that the rightists are preparing the way for a monarchy.

And the rightists - the nationalists and the Nazis - are now a potent force. Riding on the wave of nationalism they have an excellent chance for increasing their following in the reichstag election of July 31. The rumor factories have it, despite authoritative denials, that President von Hindenburg will resign on his 88th birthday next October and recommend that the former crown prince, Friedrich Wilhelm, assume temporary administration of Germany.

The timid element among the Republicans fears just such a development. They discount or ignore all denials and point out that the rightists possess many facilities for preparing public opinion to accept such a step.

Watch Holland Parties The reported trip of the crown prince to Holland to visit his father, and reports that this followed a consultation at Dorn between the ex-emperor and General Franz von Epp, leader of the Bavarian Nazis, caused audible moans of apprehension in left and centrist circles.

Moreover they have constantly in mind the plain talk by Adolf Hitler, chief of Germany's largest party. His persistent attacks on the "November system" republic, his appeals for a return to the old Prussian spirit, his outspoken eulogies of the Hohenzollerns, never once have raised a hoot or a jeer from the millions who have heard him.

The last season of the Prussian diet heard a vivid eulogy of the Hohenzollerns by the Nazi floorleader, Wilhelm Kube. Attacking a communist motion to abolish the pensions and damages paid to former royalty, he said: "We national socialists honor the great past of our people and nation. Without the Hohenzollerns, without Frederick the Great, without Wilhelm I, not a single one of you in the opposition would be sitting here."

Claims Workers' Support "If you've no further complaint to bring against our comrade Prince August Wilhelm except that he is a Hohenzollern, let me remind you that not Braun or Sovering (Republican ministers of Prussia) but the Hohenzollerns made Prussian history!" "None of you can deny that the biggest part of the working class would rather march shoulder to shoulder with a Hohenzollern than with a Jewish profiteer."

And when the November Republicans have to get out of Prussia, there will be an exodus which will make the flight of the children of Israel look like child's play!" In the same debate, one plain spoken German nationalist deputy said: "We nationalists want it to be known that with the end of democracy we want Germany to revert to the monarchy!"

The hour is at hand," Hitler warned only a few days ago, predicting Nazi elevation to power. "It is five minutes to twelve." "Meanwhile the nationalist press is reprinting copious articles from the Rothmere papers in England which argue that a Hohenzollern court in Berlin would bring a trade revival for all of Europe."

Russell, president of the Eugene chamber of commerce. "Dr. Kerr, if appointed," Russell said, "would be assured of a real welcome at the hands of many friends and admirers in this city. Eugene's central location and splendid railroad and highway facilities make it an ideal location for the headquarters of an economical administration of the state's educational institutions." PINE MILLS REPORT PORTLAND, Ore., July 1 (AP) - The average operation of 193 mills reporting to the Western Pine association for the week ending June 28 was 29.1 per cent of capacity or four-tenths per cent less than during the preceding week. During the week 64 mills were operating at an average of 43.9 per cent of capacity while the others were down.

Production for the week was 36,599,000 feet, shipments 34,031,000 feet and orders, 35,487,000 feet. Unfilled orders increased 2,485,000 feet. Current new business increased 5,092,000 feet; production increased 199,000 feet but shipments decreased 1,147,000 feet from the preceding week.
