

# Portland And Hollywood Still Deadlocked

## BOTH DUCKS AND STARS VICTORIOUS IN FRIDAY GAMES

### Portland Wins From Los Angeles in Ten Innings While Stars Outslug Sacs 14 to 8.

Hollywood and Portland were still deadlocked today at the top of the Coast League standings, each winning last night.

It took Portland ten innings to raze out Los Angeles 7 to 5. The Ducks staged a four-run outburst in the ninth to tie the score. A home run by Bob Johnson in the tenth ended the game. Portland is ahead in the series, three games to one. Batteries for Los Angeles, Herrmann, Sweetland and Campbell; for Portland, Zahniser, Koupal and Palmisano.

The Stars evened their series with Sacramento at two games apiece by administering a 14 to 8 defeat to the Senators in a free hitting game. 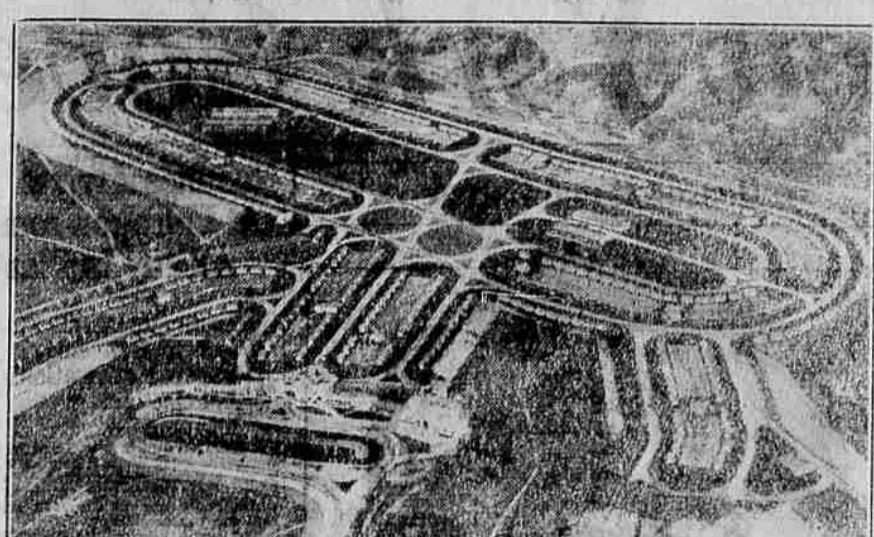

## VINES IS WINNER OF TENNIS TITLE

### Defeats Bunny Austin of England in Wimbledon Final Match Today.

WIMBLEDON, England, July 2 (AP)—Edsworth Vines Jr., American champion, today won the prized Wimbledon tennis title, defeating H. W. (Bunny) Austin of England, in the final match 6-4, 6-2, 6-0.

Elizabeth Ryan and Helen Jacobs, American doubles team, were defeated today for the Wimbledon doubles championship in the final by Doris Metaxa, of France, and Josane Sigart, of Belgium, 6-4, 6-3.

The stands were beginning to fill as the doubles final, first of four to be decided today, was run off, and 25,000 persons, a capacity crowd, had jammed into seats as Vines and Austin took the court for the men's singles final.

King George and Queen Mary were late in arriving and the match was delayed beyond the scheduled time pending their arrival.

Easy Victory  
The lanky Vines, white cap, pulled down over his eyes, merely toyed with England's leading player, overweighing Austin with the force of his drives and his masterful court covering.

His is the fourth American to win the English title, considered the most prized possession of the world's tennis courts, and succeeds a fellow American, Sidney B. Wood Jr., who won it in 1929, and repeated in 1931, and 1930. William T. Johnston was the other American victor, in 1923.

## Egan and Hogan In Golf Finals In Portland, Ore.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 2 (AP)—Veteran golfer, noted for the brilliance of a 20-year-old youth, El Chandler Egan, of Medford, who won a national amateur championship several years before his opponent was born, and Eddie Hogan, of Portland, match stroked on the rolling slopes of the Alderwood country club today for the Pacific Northwest amateur title.

Both former titleholders, Hogan goes into the 36-hole finals after a stiff battle through the semi-finals, while Egan breezed through with ease.

While Hogan was noosing out Johnny Shields of Seattle, Washington state champion, 3 and 1, yesterday, with Shields fighting stubbornly the entire round, Egan trounced Robbins, of Portland, 8 and 7, in an easy victory.

Only by making every shot count was Hogan able to come through. At noon he held a slim margin of one hole and increased it to four as they passed the 26th hole. At that stage, Shields started a dazzling rally, and it just fell short of winning, with Shields failing to make the green in three on the 17th and conceding Hogan a 12-foot putt, for a birdie three.

In the women's finals, two veterans from the south and the other from the north, will meet M. Egan Potter, 14th Alto, dominating champion, plays Mrs. Vera Hutchings, Vancouver, British Columbia champion.

## Brown Clan Sees Action Friday In Big Leagues

There being no particular news in the fact that the National league had a new leader today (what, again?) and that the Yankees' march over the American had been reduced to a bare nine games, it might be of interest to take up the case of the Browns.

It has been discovered, with practically no research at all, that there are only four members of the far-flung Brown clan in the major leagues, and that all four of them are pitchers. There must be something that impels a Brown, when he decides upon a big league career, to turn to the curving art.

The list now includes Bobby Brown, Braves sensation; Clint Brown of Cleveland, Lloyd Brown of Washington, and Walter Brown of the Yankees, all of them very good pitchers. Clint was the only one that didn't see action yesterday.

It was a fellow named Werneke, however, who did the day's most important pitching. He licked the Cincinnati Reds, 8 to 4, thereby putting the Chicago Cubs back at the head of the National league parade and becoming the first pitcher in the circuit to win 10 games.

The Pittsburgh Pirates dropped into second place, four points behind the Cubs, when they lost to the Cardinals, 5 to 3. Steve Swetonic, seeking his ninth victory in ten games, was the Cardinals' victim. Although knocked out in the sixth inning, Dizzy Dean was credited with the victory.

Another of the league's top flingers, Huck Betts, encountered defeat when he pitched for the St. Louis Cardinals, 5 to 4. Frank Hogan's homer with two aboard and Bill Terry's triple in the eighth, followed by Ott's single, were the blows that deprived Betts of his tenth triumph. Bobby Brown finished for him.

Four Yankee pitchers, including Walt Brown, were pounded for 13 hits as the Boston Red Sox finally rang up victory No. 13. The score was 11 to 6.

The Athletics lost their opener to Washington 7 to 5. The senators bunched all their eight hits off Roy Mahaffey in two big innings to hand him his seventh straight reverse. Lloyd Brown was the winner.
