Discovery Puts Mere Man On Par With The Woman! By Howard W. Hakesler (Associated Press Science Editor)

NEW YORK, July 2 (AP)—The first scientific evidence that men have two sex hormones instead of only one was published Friday in Science.

The discovery puts man on a par with women in the possession of two of these health regulators has been known for some time. The old, well-known male hormone—once popularized by its use for "rejuvenation" experiments—gives the male bird his gorgeous feathers and man his similarly "secondary" sex characteristics.

The new one does none of these spectacular things, according to its discoverer, Dr. Roy McCullagh, of the Cleveland Clinic Foundation. Instead it works quietly but directly on the pituitary gland, and thence on important health factors which the pituitary controls. The pituitary is a small, ductless gland at the base of the brain.

All Dr. McCullagh's experiments have been made on rats. But he cites human data to indicate that probably failure of this newly found hormone is the cause of prostatic gland enlargement, a serious ailment of male middle age. Major operations are now the cure. Simply giving the hormone may suffice if Dr. McCullagh's ideas prove correct.
