

# Few Price Changes Over The Weekend

## BUTTER MARKET STEADY; MAKE IS SHOWING SLUMP

General Reduction of Apricot Prices Suggested With Increasing Stocks Reaching Market

PORTLAND, Ore., July 5 (AP) — Trading in the butter market is considered steady with no changes in the price over the holiday. Late make has shown a very liberal local decrease while country receipts have been slightly less than the previous week.

There remains a general lack of price changes in the market for eggs with further decrease in receipts. The bulk of the loss is due to the ending of the big lay of farm eggs.

With cheese production showing a decrease for the season to date, conditions in the market generally appear more or less steady character. Little change in prices is suggested during recent activities in leading producing points of the country. The fact that the eastern trade is holding up indicates that the extreme low reached some time ago was the greatest dip of recent years.

In general full steady in the poultry market for live poultry and especially hens and broilers. Receipts are not so liberal in the broiler market and these are firmest of all.

Arrival of the first new crop honey offerings out of the Willamette valley is reported out of Tangent, initially priced at \$4 a cask. Rather dark.

There was quite a supply of country killed meats carried over the holiday. Beef, lamb and veal were held out but hogs generally moved out.

There is still a fair movement of hothouse tomatoes but the volume is decreasing with the greater stocks of outdoor stuff. Sales mostly 9@11c lb. The Dalles outdoor stock increasing slowly and prices are down.

General reduction of apricot prices is suggested with the increasing stocks in from The Dalles here as well as promise of increase in the Yakima movement.

Notes of wholesale trading: Delano, Cal. cantaloupes are arriving and selling around 25c crate higher than Imperial.

General citrus fruit market is unchanged. Green peppers are very slow around a dime a pound.

Cauliflower is weak and generally with a 75 cent extreme. Head lettuce is down about a dime a crate.

Yellow California onions are lower. New potatoes are off a fraction or so. Outdoor cucumbers are weaker and lower in spots.

MAY COMBINE STAMPS Postmaster R. H. Burton of La Grande, today pointed out that with the new rate, one-cent and one-two-cent stamp may be placed on envelopes, serving the same as one three-cent stamp.

Airmail will be 8c for first ounce and 13c for each additional ounce. The airmail stamps will not be put out in the new denomination, but the extra amount can be added in regular stamps.

Letters for local delivery will also be 3c Mr. Huron adds.

## Garner Is Given Great Ovation By Colleagues

WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP)—Speaker John N. Garner, Democratic vice presidential nominee, was greeted with a tremendous burst of applause today as he walked into the house chamber to take the chair for the first time since his nomination.

By previous arrangement, an unusually large number of members were present. The speaker delayed his entrance until just a few minutes before the noon meeting hour.

Garner took the chair, laid his glasses on the desk and rapped for order in vain. At first he stared fixedly at a small card, as if embarrassed, but finally looked up and smiled as the ovation continued for several minutes, punctuated by rebel yells and shouts.

Finally order was restored for the opening prayer. Immediately afterward, Representative Snell, the Republican leader, came forward to the desk and personally congratulated Garner.

This was the signal for another outbreak of applause from the Democrats, who arose to their feet with cheers. Snell was permanent chairman of the Republican national convention.

Later at his press conference, Garner said there was "not going to be any expense" attached to his formal notification of the nomination. "I thought it was through with it when I sent a telegram to Representative Sam Rayburn, chairman of the Texas delegation," Garner said with a smile.

The speaker said Senator Walsh of Montana, the permanent chairman of the convention is over in the senate and does not cost anything for bus fare or any other kind of transportation to come over from the senate to the house.

Sinking for 30 days under recurrent earthquake shocks, the west coast of Mexico finally was deluged under a tidal wave that swept far inland in the states of Colima and Jalisco, causing wide-spread damage and taking a toll of 34 known dead.
