miles an hour which they averaged from Harbor Grace to Berlin. They would have reached the Siberian city some time in the forenoon today.

At noon today their elapsed time from the takeoff at New York was 54 hours and 59 minutes. Wiley Post and Harold Gatty, who set the round-the-world mark which Mattern and Griffin are trying to lower, landed at Moscow with 64 hours and 34 minutes elapsed time.

GERMANS WORRIED

BERLIN, July 7 (AP) — German air police at Tempelhof airbase here were worried this morning when no reports had been received up to 9 a. m. from the round-the-world fliers, James Mattern and Bennett Griffin, since they took off for Moscow yesterday afternoon.

The only word of them was a belated dispatch from Koenigsberg this morning which said they had crossed the German frontier into Poland at 12:02 a. m. (6:05 p. m. E. S. T., Wednesday). They were sighted over Lake Wysztyt, near Hegeligen.

Considerable concern was expressed over the fate of the Americans by the police, who said they could not understand why there had been no report of the fliers having been sighted at any point between here and Moscow, or why they had not reached their next goal in 12 hours time.

The distance was covered by Wiley Post and Harold Gatty, last year's round-the-world team, in a little less than 9 hours. At 9 a. m. today Mattern and Griffin had been gone from here 12 hours.

The newspaper Zwoelf Uhr Blatt said this morning its reports indicated the fliers faced unfavorable weather, with thunderstorms and rainstorms over Russia.

FAMILY ANXIOUS

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 7 (AP) — Six anxious members of Bennett Griffin's family who waited news here today of the unreported round-the-world fliers, expressed the belief that Griffin and Jimmy Mattern had overshoot Moscow on their hop from Berlin and were headed for Omsk, Siberia.

The relatives are the flier's wife; his mother, Mrs. J. B. Griffin; three sisters, Roby, Donna and Alma, and a brother, Jeff Griffin.

CUT SALARIES OF STATE EMPLOYEES

Further action of the board, during an executive session held here last night authorized an investigation of the salary schedule looking toward standardization. It was estimated about \$200,000 would be saved to the state by the salary reductions the remaining six months of the year.

The schedule now effective is as follows: Reduction of 15 per cent on all salaries in excess of \$6000 a year; 10 per cent on all salaries from \$4000 to \$6000 inclusive and a 3 to 10 per cent reduction on all salaries from \$1200 to \$4000. The monthly schedule under the last phase is as follows:

\$100 to \$129 inclusive, 3 per cent. \$130 to \$159 inclusive, 4 per cent. \$160 to \$199 inclusive, 5 per cent. \$200 to \$229 inclusive, 6 per cent. \$230 to \$259 inclusive, 7 per cent. \$260 to \$299 inclusive, 8 per cent. \$300 to \$330 inclusive, 9 per cent.

MUSCLE INJURIES

With the advent of the outdoor sport season, there is a widespread increase in muscle, tendon and joint injuries.

Some of these are incidental to such games as baseball and tennis. Others, on the other hand, result from the injudicious and excessive use of the muscles in violent exercise.

It is not ordinarily appreciated that muscles may be responsible for damage to themselves by virtue of their own power of contraction. While an uncommon form of injury, muscles have been known to rupture or break.

Muscle injuries may also be due to external violence. A blow upon a muscle during a boxing bout or as the result of being hit by a ball, a bat or other hard object, may cause a temporary paralysis of the affected muscle and a partial rupture of the muscle fibers.

Contracted muscles are particularly likely to suffer from such injuries. The professional clown whose jumbling tricks would soon break an ordinary man's neck accomplishes his
