

# Most Churches Now on Summer Schedule Here

## ATTENDANCE IS GOOD DESPITE VACATION TIME

### Several Fine Programs Are Announced For Sunday in La Grande Houses of Worship.

Churches generally, with the hot summer weather here to stay for a few weeks, have gone on a vacation scheduled in La Grande, although a few of the houses of worship continue their full quota of Sunday services.

Here and there a church is observing a regular vacation with the pastor away, and others are planning to give their ministers a short leave of absence a little later in the summer.

The majority of the La Grande churches, however, report very good attendance in spite of the vacation period that draws many away to seashores, mountains and distant points. Services tomorrow include the following:

**St. Peter's Church (Episcopal)** (Fourth street and O Ave.)  
The services at St. Peter's church on Sunday will consist of a celebration of the Holy Communion at 8:00 o'clock and morning prayer and sermon at 11:00 o'clock. There will be no church school until the first Sunday in September. Everyone is cordially invited to attend these services.

**Ascension Episcopal Church** (Cove, Oregon)  
There will be evening prayer and sermon at Ascension church, Cove, on Sunday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock to which everyone is invited.

**Church of the Nazarene** (Y avenue at Birch street)  
Services at the Church of the Nazarene Sunday will be as follows: Sunday school, 9:45; morning service, 11:00; sermon "Love Not The World" by Rev. Daniel L. Swartz, pastor; organist, Frank Cair, and special music by Mrs. Swartz; young people's meeting, 6:45 p. m. with Frank Cair as leader; evening services, 7:30 p. m. It is reported that the "Rustlers" in the young people's contest, are gaining on the "Go-getters."

**Rev. Earl Pounds, district superintendent**, will be the speaker Sunday evening.

"Sacrament" will be the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, July 10. The Golden Text will be, "Let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread, and drink of that cup" (I Cor. 11:28).

Among the citations which comprise the Lesson-Sermon will be the following words of Jesus as found in the Bible: "He that hath my commandments, and keepeth them, he it is that loveth me; and he that loveth me shall be loved of my Father, and I will love him, and will manifest myself to him" (John 14:21).

TIENSIN, China (AP)—This city of her birth knows better than any other the family background of beauty and brains which Sari Maritza, now blond exotic of the films, has brought to her career in Hollywood.

Tientsin knew her as a child, when she lived in a castle, the daughter of one of China's most famous foreign families.

In Hollywood Sari Maritza's path to stardom is being laid carefully with good featured roles, and in five months there she has appeared in, but two pictures—and not as star but as a featured player.

She is not to be thrust upon the screen as a star at once, as has been the fate of many beauties of equal promise who become, in consequence, mere "flashes-in-the-pan," her friends here learn. But stardom is definitely in the studio's plans for her.

**BULB-DIGGING TIME**  
OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, July 8—It is bulb digging time in Oregon, reminds Dr. F. P. McWhorter, federal pathologist, stationed here working on diseases of the west's expanding flowering bulb industry. Dr. McWhorter is always reminded of the season forcibly by the deluge of inquiries he receives on how and when to care for the bulbs after the blooming season is past.

"To dig or not to dig" is answered by Dr. McWhorter by saying that narcissus are best dug every one to three years and tulips every year. The sweet-scented late varieties of narcissus are better left undisturbed for at least three years, he says. Early July is a good time to dig these. Bulbous iris are best left till after the middle of July in the northern part of the state at least. They are left in the ground for two years after planting.

"In digging tulips or other bulbs for that matter it is important to dig the clumps complete and unbroken, shake off the dirt gently and allow them to dry in the shade before cleaning them further," says Dr. McWhorter. "Tulips are left in paper sacks or other containers, then stored in a cool place and left undisturbed till planting time. It is important not to try to clean or separate tulip bulbs till near planting time, otherwise injury and rotting is likely to result."

"Narcissus are easier handled than tulips. After they are partially dry the clumps may be broken apart where they are obviously ready to divide. They are then piled in a shallow layer in boxes and stored in a cool place. Careful handling, shallow layers and cool storage are important."

"For home use one may dip narcissus bulbs in Ceresan solution, 1 pound to 10 gallons of water, which will improve the growth of the bulb. As the bulbs must be dry before treating, at least three weeks is allowed between digging and dipping."

"If at the time of digging narcissus bulbs are soft and partially rotted, bulb flies may be present. Most commercial growers are glad to co-operate in fumigating private stocks as a means of removing a menace to commercial plantings."

**A Famous Wedding**

It was through Von Detring's influence that the Chinese Engineering and Mining company obtained its concession, and this connection was maintained when Major Walter Nathan, head of the munition company in Tientsin, married one of Detring's daughters. Sari Maritza in real life is Patricia Nathan.

Her English father is one of five notably successful brothers. One of them is Sir Matthew Nathan, former governor of Queensland; another Colonel Sir Frederick Nathan, once an important figure in India, Brazil and Hawaii.

The Detring-Nathan marriage was one of the most notable alliances of brains and beauty in the history of the foreign communities of North China.

Sari Maritza's grandmother, Madame Detring, was famed for her wit and loveliness. An aristocrat to her fingertips, she came of an old Viennese noble family and was greatly beloved in Tientsin.

She was still a woman of surpassing beauty, despite her years, when she sadly bade farewell to Tientsin a few years ago and left her picturesque castle for Europe.

Sari Maritza and her sister Diana, a brunette beauty, are the beauty of their mother and grandmother.

**Famed As Swimmer**

Of Sari's varied accomplishments, that which lingers most in the memory of old residents here is her aquatic skill. There was nobody in these parts, they say, to compete with her as a diver. She acquired her skill at the seaside resort of Feltathe, where her family also had a palatial residence.

Sari's former governess, a Scots-woman, is still a resident of Tientsin, proud of the progress of her former charge. The bane of Sari's life as a child she recalls was her mane of long fair curls, but Sari cried when these were cut off at school.

**AUSTRALIAN DAIRYMEN BALK: MILK FOR PUBLIC CURTAILED**

PERTH, Australia (AP)—Dairymen have decided to supply no more milk to the people of Perth at present prices.

They demand 28 cents a gallon for their milk, but the distributing companies refused to pay more than 22 cents.

So the dairymen announced their intentions to turn all their milk into butter. Only sufficient milk for hospitals and invalids and infants will be available.
