David Hutton Gets Confidence Vote

LOS ANGELES, July 13 (Sp)—A demand for the discharge of Roy A. Watkins, an investigator, and a statement reaffirming confidence in David Hutton were issued Tuesday by the board of officers of Angelus Temple, clarifying a maze of rumors growing out of the St. Pierre-Hutton breach of promise suit.

The statement apparently put an end to reports that the governing body of the famous temple had been aligned against the husband of the evangelist, Aimee McPherson Hutton, since Myrtle St. Pierre, a nurse, won a \$5000 verdict over him for breach of promise.

While the position taken concerning Hutton occasioned no surprise, the move to oust Watkins was unexpected. Watkins had figured prominently in the trial as a collector of information for Hutton's name and attempts had been made to name him as a witness burler.

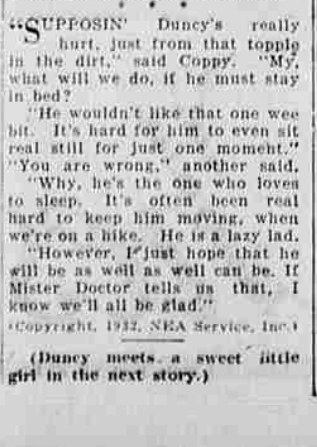
