SPANISH LAW RESTORES WOMEN TO BULL RINGS

ALICANTE, Spain (AP)—As the Spanish constitution gives women equal rights with men, feminine bull fighters have reappeared in the arenas.

Century-Old Drapes Removed From 'Venus Of The Vatican'

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The Venus of the Vatican has lost the bronze skirt she wore for 125 years.

The marble life-size figure is known as the Gudian Venus, an early Roman copy of a work by the immortal Greek sculptor Praxiteles.

When it was brought to the Vatican galleries more than a century ago the pope commissioned the Danish sculptor, Albert Thorswaldsen, to mould bronze draperies to cover the lower half of the statue, down to the feet.

From then until a few days ago the masterpiece occupied one of the most prominent points in the Vatican galleries—at the head of the steps near the entrance to the Etruscan museum. This position was similar to that assigned to the Venus di Milo in the Louvre museum at Paris.

Here millions of tourists have viewed the goddess of love most modestly garbed. Many of them, however, puzzled over what seemed a garment of painted tin.

Artists and sculptors for generations have complained bitterly against the bronze clothing. Finally their pleas were successful. Nothing was said about it, but one day recently the skirt was taken away.

But, her skirt gone, the beautiful goddess lost her prominent position. She now presides over a small room called the "Cabinet of the Masks" because of a mosaic taken from Hadrian's Villa, depicting Greek masks and fitted into the center of the floor.

The Vatican gallery authorities, however, have made another concession. They have taken from the store room a group by Praxiteles, "The Three Graces," half-life-size, and placed it alongside the Gudian Venus. This is composed of three nudes.

Held Under Guard in Her Home

Kill Farm Bill Both Hoover And Garner Blamed

Blame for the failure of congress to pass the one-year emergency farm relief bill sponsored by Senator Norbeck (R. S. D.) was shuttled between Speaker Garner and the threat of a presidential veto.

The senate definitely killed the measure for this session when it reconsidered its previous action in passing the bill.

Speaker Garner told newspaper men President Hoover looked with disfavor on the Norbeck plan. The speaker added:

"Congress appears to be taking the attitude that it is useless to waste energy in passing a bill that is going to be vetoed."

However, Edward A. O'Neil, president of the American farm bureau federation, and Earl O. Smith, president of the Illinois agricultural association, in a later statement laid the blame on the speaker as well as those who supported, in the senate, the motion by Bingham (R. Conn.) to reconsider.

TAXES STOP POLISH AUTOS

WARSAW (AP)—Economic conditions have combined with the road tax of 1931 to cut the number of automobiles in Poland. In six months registrations dropped from 42,737 to 36,217, a reduction of 14 per cent.

Novices Crowd Movie Stunt Men; They'll Risk Lives For Any Price

HOLLYWOOD—The desperation of hungry men eager to risk their lives for a few dollars and a meal has thrown movie stunt men into competition as fierce as it is pitiable.

It has also retarded schemes for an organization in the perilous craft to standardize wages and assure competence, thus lessening danger to life.

Harvey Parry, who for several years has jumped from cliffs, wrecked automobiles, walked airplane wings, dangled from skyscraper roofs or taken beatings from film heroes in prize rings, was called the other day to write an automobile for a movie scene. When he reported he found five other men waiting in line for the assignment.

"One poor fellow begged for the chance, asking only a meal and five dollars," says Harvey. "The regular price for the job is \$50, and this man never had skidded a car and had no idea how we protect ourselves."

"When I first started stunting, I got \$1500 for walking the wings and taking a parachute jump. Now the price is down almost to the ground."

Parry and other leading stunt men advocate licensing of their profession, not only to maintain standards of pay, but to safeguard the desperate from their own folly. The Times, however, veto the idea.

Incidentally, from Parry I learned a few odd facts about movie prize fights. In "Winner Take All" you'll see James Cagney fighting for the "title" with Parry, and Parry will appear to be the bigger of the two.

The first day they work on the fight scenes Parry weighed in at 139 and Cagney at 152. (The second day Parry was the same, but Cagney had lost eight pounds. So they really work, these movie fighters.)

Tricks Of The Camera

How does it happen that a man, actually smaller, looks bigger on the screen than his adversary? It's oil, partly, says Parry, oil that makes the muscles stand out photographically—and, of course, camera trickery.

For once the movies failed to bite when a best-selling novel was offered as bait by a haughty author. The scornful literatus evaded \$60,000 for his work, which even movie executives, usually impressed by sales reports, could see would make only a fair picture. The author, refusing to compromise, hid himself and his book to England for celluloid embalming.

And the studio is just as happy.

French Completing Plane For Flight Into Stratosphere

BILLANCOURT, France (AP)—France hopes within six months to enter the race for the conquest of the stratosphere.

In the Farman airplane works, on the banks of the Seine, behind bolted doors and pledged to secrecy, engineers and skilled workmen are putting the finishing touches to a huge 500 h. p. monoplane.

Goal is 50,000 Feet
When it is completed, the stratospheric airplane will be taken to the airport of Toussus-le-Noble where the first test flight will take place. It will be followed by other experimental flights aimed at attaining a height of 50,000 feet above the earth's surface.

A feature of the new aircraft is its enormous wing area and its all-metal air-tight cabin which can accommodate three to four persons.

Its circular, conical, lower surrounding the air-tight cabin gives it the shape of a submarine. Inside the cylindrical cabin is an instrument board and a dozen gadgets all suggesting the interior of a submarine.

Wing Surface Enormous
In building an enormous wing surface, the designers had in mind the fact that in the thin stratosphere where the propeller and wings are much less effective than at heights of 5000 to 10,000 feet good deal more lifting power may be required for successful operation.

If all the hopes of the designers are fulfilled, the machine, when at an altitude of 48,000 to 50,000 feet, will develop a speed of 480 miles an hour, which will bring New York within eight hours of Paris.

Take-Off Difficulty Seen
It is pointed out that owing to its excessive load—it is equipped with five radiators—the new Farman may experience some difficulty in taking off.

The ascension to the thin cold areas is not expected to begin before six months, as the new machine will be subjected to various tests and alterations made accordingly.

STRIPP FINALLY SHATTERS CLOCK IN REDLAND FIELD

CINCINNATI (AP)—The clock on the left field fence of Redland field finally got what was coming to it.

Situated near the foul line 339 feet from home plate, National league batters for years have been shooting at its glass face, which is approximately three feet in diameter.

Jersey Joe Stripp, Brooklyn infielder, was the hero in a game with the Reds. Stripp drove out a liner that smashed the glass into a thousand pieces. The hit was good for two bases. Before his successful blow Stripp received plenty of target practice while a member of the Reds.

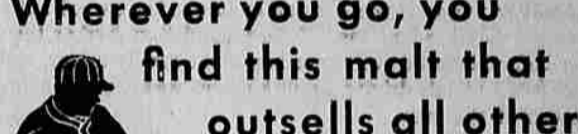
