Traffic accidents cost Tennesseans more than \$13,500,000 annually, it is estimated.

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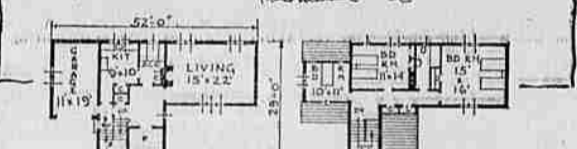

The estimated \$543,000,000 cost for a 27-foot waterway from the sea to all Canadian and American points on the Great Lakes.

Ohio Invokes Whipping Post



The first whipping post Ohio has seen in 50 years was invoked at Millersburg, O., for the punishment of two men who admitted stealing a refrigerator. Administering the 20 strokes as directed by the sentence of Common Pleas Judge Robert B. Putnam, Sheriff John Stevens is seen above lashing William Wynn, 48, one of the prisoners. Wynn's brother, Jesse, 51, received like punishment a few moments later. When the sheriff's buggy whip broke, a blacksnake whip was pressed into service. The men made no outcry and neither was marked. They chose the whipping rather than accept a 20-day sentence at hard labor on bread and water after they had served 25 days in jail awaiting arraignment.

To Agree on Details
In that connection Mr. Hoover recently informed his rival for the presidency in November—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, of New York—that federal authorities would confer with those of the interested states to agree on details once the treaty is finally effected.

As to diversion of water from Lake Michigan upon the nine foot waterway from Chicago to the Mississippi, the president was assured by the war department that the treaty provides sufficiently for maintenance of that waterway.

The treaty question has been hanging fire for eleven years, and officials estimate that once the agreement is in complete effect it will take probably ten years to construct the waterway.

During the time, Mr. Hoover said, "normal growth of traffic in the nation will far more than compensate for any diversions from American railways and other American port facilities."

Seven years is estimated by the engineers as a reasonable time for completing the work.

The gigantic project calls for development of the St. Lawrence for a 180-mile stretch from Montreal to Lake Ontario—an eight-year task. It will enable ocean-going vessels to travel to the heart of the continent.
