Cove Orchards Yield Fruit To Cherry Pickers

By Mrs. A. G. Conklin (Observer Correspondent) COVE (Special)—The cherry harvest is at its height, the orchards are full of pickers, and both of the packing houses are running full tilt. At the co-operative packing house there are two belts in operation, that will accommodate about 30 packers and nearly as many sorters, besides all the extra help needed, such as weighers, halers, boxmakers, stampers, etc., besides any number of men needed in handling the cherries, to put them on the tables, etc. It is certainly a busy place and to the on-looker it most nearly resembles a bee-hive. Then too, there is always

a string of wagons waiting to be unloaded, as well as one or two trucks being loaded. One carload of fruit has been shipped and another has been shipped and another is nearly ready. The Spackland packing house is quite as busy, though not quite as large, but handles about as much fruit during the season.
