## ADVANCE WAS NOT UNEXPECTED DUE TO GOOD DEMAND

Shortage of Extras and Standards Gives Better Undertone to the Entire Trade.

PORTLAND, July 21 (AP)—Advance of 1c lb. in the price of cube butter on the produce exchange here was not at all unexpected in view of the scramble recently for top score offerings generally along the coast. The advance to 18c for extras was therefore due. However the rise of a similar amount in underscores was more than any special need for such a rise. The shortage of extras and standards, gave a somewhat better undertone to the entire trade and forced the movement of underscores into consuming channels.

For several days there has been rather keen strength in the California marketing owing to the great decrease in the churning there and along the coast. Much northwest stock has been moved in that direction as a result of the higher prices which naturally forced the upward swing here.

Butterfat made the customary advance of 1c lb. which is now effective.

Market for celery is somewhat depressed at practically all points. Several cartloads have recently been rolled from the Lahab section but no sales are confirmed. Locally the market is overloaded.

Waspo cantaloupes are being offered \$2.25 crate for 24 to 40c higher. New apples are very slow sale and prices are weak.

## MAKES TRADE PROPOSAL TO ALL KINGDOM

(Continued from Page One)

One of the first acts of the conference was to approve a message of loyalty to the king. The delegates from the Irish Free State voted in favor of this action, and their vote was of particular interest because of the controversy over President Eamon De Valera's attempt to abolish the oath of allegiance to the crown. King George V. in a message read by the governor general, reminded the delegates they were writing on a new page of history and their efforts might go far toward solving the economic troubles which weigh not only upon the British empire but upon the rest of the world.

The efforts of this conference, he said, should give full effect to the principle of co-operation upon which the empire is based. Stanley Baldwin, president of the council in the British cabinet and head of the delegation from the United Kingdom, then spoke, outlining the general purposes of the gathering.

The real importance of the conference, said he, lies in the fact that it marks a point where two roads diverge, "one leading to the development of purely national interests, the other to closer imperial unity and recognition of advantages in mutual trade co-operation."

If at the end of the conference the delegates agree that they have taken the latter road, he said, "the actual distance covered is of minor importance, because progress will continue."

Great Britain has given the dominions the privilege of free entries into ports of the United Kingdom, and the dominions have given preference to Great Britain, said Mr. Baldwin, but the opportunity of mutual exchange is being lost by the fact that a few people are involved in the system very satisfactory and runs itself, but where a larger number participate in the movement some form of exchange must be set up.

ificates. The farmer then hires men to work for him in any capacity he wishes and the men are paid with the labor certificates. The warehouse is then run as a store and anyone coming in with certificates can purchase his or her requirements from the store. There will be a small profit charged by the store since the transportation of the produce and the handling in the warehouse will be paid for with certificates and there must be produce to sell to the workers for each certificate turned in. If there are still some unemployed in the community after all the possible men are put to work in the harvest fields then these remaining can be put to work in the forests cutting wood. All the workers in the fields or the forests will be paid with certificates and thereby make it possible for them to purchase any kind of produce they need at the warehouse.

"The plan is based on the principle of increasing the circulation of a medium of exchange," Mr. Smith and Mr. Bramwell said. "There is plenty of work that can be done if there were money to pay for it. At present, money is the only medium of exchange."

In past years the rural communities have worked on a system similar to the one which has been adopted here," they added.
