the farmer in return for produce. The farmer can pay wages to hired men, who can in turn procure produce at the warehouse. The plan has been enthusiastically received by the entire county, and warehouses will be established at Elgin, Union and North Powder and will be operated by sub-committees under the

direction of the general governor's committee.

Applications Come In
Mr. Bramwell adds that several applications already have been received for service.

The Union County Labor Exchange is planning a wood business extensive and is encouraging business houses and private homes to burn wood as much as possible. A number of down-town stores are having their heating plants remodeled, changing them from coal or fuel oil burning type to wood burners, it is reported. The manager urges townpeople to apply for their winter's wood now, and pay in advance so that the movement will have sufficient funds to open for business. Men are out in the mountains now cutting wood for which they will be paid in labor certificates.

One of the most important features of the program, and one which makes it popular during the present economic situation is that it does not place a burden on anyone, since no donations are asked. Mr. Bramwell points out. The exchange does, however, ask the co-operation of the townpeople in supporting the work which has been endorsed by the governor's committee, neighboring towns, business men and the farmers—who are the backbone of the movement.

Canning Under Way
Canning activities are being carried on extensively under the direction of Mrs. Frederick Gehring, of the governor's relief committee. The Boy Scouts and Camp Fire Girls have been recruited to collect jars, and already the former group has received 400 jars. A gross of jars and caps were donated by the Interior Grocery and another by the Western States grocery.

Ericksen and Loties, cherry packers from the Interior Grocery, are being called by the committee at the Zion Lutheran church today.

Virginia is a neighbor to Ohio, where the change became effective July 23, 1931. Kentucky adjoins both Ohio and Tennessee. Utah borders Colorado, change effective September 1, 1931; Idaho, March 18, 1931; and Wyoming; while Nevada adjoins Idaho and California, where the change was made July 29, 1927. Of the remaining 3 states, Maryland has long been a divorce state for adjoining Delaware where restrictions have been in effect for some years and Florida, where Georgia where restrictions are in effect for persons under 21 years of age. New Hampshire, however, not only adjoins states where the 5 day interval law must elapse but carries the same law as its statutes.

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Contrary to an old adage, declaring "love departs when poverty arrives," matrimonial dissatisfaction, from the point of the number of divorce actions filed this year, is showing a marked decrease. A decline of 21 per cent for the first six months of this year from the first half totals of 1931 and a 30 per cent loss in comparison with 1930 are shown in the state department.

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WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)— Secretary Hyde today announced apportionment to the states of the \$120,000,000 provided under the relief bill for federal aid highway work.

These funds may be used by states in place of state money to match the regular federal aid contributions. Among the allotments made are the following: California \$4,687,188; Idaho \$1,505,912; Montana \$2,525,071; Nevada \$1,575,756; Oregon \$2,001,740; Washington \$1,820,470.

California Bonus Army Head Quits

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)— Roy W. Robertson, leader of the California contingent of the bonus army, left today for his Los Angeles home but hundreds of his followers had preceded him and others remained behind.

The crippled Californian, who arrived in Washington after the bonus vote, and then staged, with his companions, a continuous march in front of the capitol for four days and nights, went in his own automobile.

The group he had led elected Arthur Scott, of Los Angeles, as its leader for the remainder of its stay in Washington.
