

Police Fire Bonus Marchers

ONE VETERAN SHOT TO DEATH AND ANOTHER IS NOT EXPECTED TO LIVE

President Hoover Calls Out Detachment of Cavalry To Preserve Order — Two Police Report Participating in Shooting — Both Receive Injuries; Bonus Marchers in Ugly Mood After Gunplay.

WASHINGTON, July 28 (AP) — President Hoover late today issued an announcement that in order to put an end to "rioting and defiance of civil authority" arising in clashes between bonus seeking veterans and the police, he had asked the United States army to assist in restoring order.

DEAD VETERAN IDENTIFIED
WASHINGTON, July 28 (AP) — The veteran killed by police this afternoon was identified as William Hashka, about 37 years old, and from Chicago.

WASHINGTON, July 28 (AP)—One unidentified veteran was shot dead and another seriously wounded in rioting between bonus seekers and police near the capitol today, and troops were ordered out at the direction of President Hoover. A bullet through the heart was the one that killed, when police opened fire upon veterans who were advancing toward them.

A group of his comrades took the man to a hospital in a patrol wagon, accompanied by two policemen. He was dead when he reached there.

There was no mark of identification about the body, and attaches at the hospital said that his comrades were so excited they could not get his name from them.

MERCURY AT 99 ABOVE YESTERDAY
Warmest Day This Year; Thunder Storms Fail to Help Much.

La Grande was one of the hottest cities in the Pacific Northwest Wednesday when the mercury zoomed up to 99 above to establish a new 1932 heat record. The former mark, chalked up twice — once in June and once this month — was 96 above. Yesterday's maximum, however, was eight degrees under the all-time heat record for this city, which stands at 107 above.

Last night, in spite of thunder showers late Wednesday, was one of the warmest of the summer, with the minimum at 63 above. Hot winds from the southwest, which ranged from 10 to 20 miles per hour, were reported by the weather bureau.

Seaplane Crash Precedes Flight Of 420 Aircraft

One Man Killed and Five Others Hurt at San Diego — Army, Navy, Marine Corps in Flight.

SAN DIEGO, July 28 (AP) — One man was killed and five others were injured, one seriously, when a seaplane crashed into the coast guard cutter Tamaran in San Diego bay today a few minutes before the massed flight of 420 army, navy and marine coast planes.

Chief Photographer Auger was killed instantly and his body was not recovered immediately. The injured are: Harry Allen, machinist mate first class, who may die; Lieutenant (junior grade) Anderson Offutt of Fleetair; Third Class Machinist Mate Larimore, and Second Class Machinist Dale and Lang.

Auger was to have photographed the planes from the air as they passed in review before high ranking navy, army and marine corps officials, members of the National Editorial association and Amelia Earhart, noted aviatrix. The massed flight was in honor of the editors and Miss Earhart.

The massed flight was not delayed by the accident. The accident occurred when the plane swerved to avoid striking a sail boat. The Tamaran, putting to sea on regular patrol duty, came in line with the roaring amphibian and was struck on its bow. The plane sank, but was recovered in a few minutes.

Williams Tells Of Bonus Army Storming Steps

First hand impressions of the bonus army in Washington, D. C., were described this morning by Sherman Williams, La Grande teacher, who returned yesterday from a trip to Birmingham, where he was a delegate to the national Elks convention.

Mr. Williams watched the bonus army on the evening of July 24th, when the army was ordered to cross the plaza and occupy the capitol steps. "The men seemed very orderly," he said. "The bonus men are apparently making a commercial thing of their occupation. It seems to be profitable for many of them—they have their own concessions, and many of them are selling their newspapers, citizens are approached constantly by 'vets,' selling souvenirs of some sort, and it is a life term."

GUILTY PLEA ENTERED; LIFE TERM LIKELY

SALEM, July 28 (AP)—Robert Ripley, on trial here for the murder of James Iverson, Silverton night watchman, on May 31, 1931, this noon entered a plea of guilty to first degree murder.

Ripley will be sentenced Saturday and it was reported he will be given a life term.

WALLA WALLA WHEAT NOT SO GOOD

Adolf Hitler Says Democracy In Germany Will End In Few More Days

BERLIN, July 28 (AP) — Democracy in Germany is given only a few more days of life today by Adolf Hitler, fiery national socialist leader.

Hitler's campaign posters today set him up as "Germany's Oliver Cromwell" and referred to Cromwell's words, uttered as he closed the British parliament and established his dictatorship nearly 300 years ago — "Take away that bubble!"

The national socialist Premier Roever of Oldenburg, where a Nazi state government is in control, went one better than Hitler, who has said that "heads shall roll" when the Nazis come into power in the nation.

In a speech at Kassel, referring to the opponents of the Nazis, Roever said: "I guarantee that these schwein-hunde will be hanged, and we'll leave their bodies swinging until the crowd has finished with them."

Ask Donations Of Clothing To Aid Relief Work

Another Division of Union County Organization is Ready to Begin its Operations.

Another division of the Union county aid program was virtually ready to get into action today with announcement from Mrs. W. D. Hanks, general chairman of clothing relief, that a large staff of La Grande women will call soon at every home in the city for clothing contributions.

The work will be speeded up to make it possible to begin actual distribution to the needy after Aug. 24. A carefully outlined plan for combing the city thoroughly was outlined yesterday by Mrs. Hanks who has made a detailed study of the system to be put into use in the effort to secure and remake clothes for unemployed families. Representatives of church and parent teacher organizations have been put in charge of districts in which they reside. They will direct soliciting and will turn over the material collected to their respective organizations who will make over the clothes secured.

"We are making a most urgent plea to housewives throughout the city to co-operate with us in this effort," said Mrs. Hanks this morning. "We are appealing to them for all the clothing they can possibly donate. Clothes for all ages can be used and made over," she continued.

Laundries in the city have offered to do all the washing for the committee free of charge. They make one request, that the organizations

WOMAN, SON, PRINCE KILLED IN AIR CRASH

PARNHAM, Surrey, England, July 28 (AP)—Mrs. Alfred C. Bosson, American wife of the noted British architect, and her son, Prince Otto Erback Furstnau, of Germany, were dead today following the explosion and crash of their airplane last night near here.

Mrs. Bosson, formerly Emily Blaine, daughter of Samuel G. Bayne, president of the Seaboard National bank of New York, was on her way from Hampton, where the plane, piloted by her son, appeared to explode and crashed in splinters.

Two Convicted Of Stealing Train Ride

Edwin M. Kivette, son of the late W. R. Kivette, who was at one time a La Grande citizen, is lodged in jail here, following conviction before Judge L. Denham on charges of stealing a ride on a train. With him is Dewey Wilson, who was found guilty of the same charge. Both were sentenced to five days in jail. W. L. Gary, special agent for the O.-W., made the arrest.

Smut and Light Weight Tend To Cut Down Value

WALLA WALLA, Wash., July 28 (Special)—Walla Walla county's 1932 wheat crop is showing none too high grade, according to dealers, who have received sufficient samples from harvest to conclude that smut, light weight wheat and other penalties will tend to reduce the value of the crop somewhat.

In many fields several bushels to the acre were lost through shattering, owing to break winds early in the month. The wheat was damaged in some regions by hot days in June, it is believed, and while berries are not pinched especially, many of them are small.

The bellier is expressed that the total crop will be about 5,000,000 bushels. Some of the best yields are coming from Eureka flat and north-west of Dry creek where up to 35 bushels are being obtained in fields that lost an estimated 5 bushels by shattering.

TEAM WIN IS HELD CERTAIN FOR AMERICA

Battle at Olympic Games, However, Will Be For First Places

LUCK NEEDED TO WIN SEVEN FIRSTS

Uncle Sam Doped As Sure Winner in 400-Meter Race, Pole Vault and the High Jump.

LOS ANGELES, July 28 (AP) — The United States is again assured the team decision, on points, in the forthcoming Olympic track and field competition, but insofar as first places are concerned, representing the chief and only official awards recognized by the international games, your Uncle Sammie expects to have his hands full from the outset.

Finland, Great Britain, Japan and Germany, with some scattered help from Italy, Poland and Czechoslovakia, will carry the main Olympic battle to the Americans, with the prospect they may upset some of the favored homebreds and contribute to a sensational series of performances.

Many Records May Fall
It will not be surprising to see Olympic records broken in 22 of the 23 track and field events and a new standard established in the remaining new event, the 50,000 meter walk. In track events, the national championship or tryout competition, they have all been surpassed by athletes assembled for the world championships here. As many as a dozen world records also may tumble in this general attack on time, height and distance.

NATIONAL GRAIN SET-UP ATTACKED

Former Director of Corporation Says it is Not Farmer-Owned

KANSAS CITY, July 28 (AP) — A scathing denunciation of the farmers' national grain corporation, a federal farm board set-up, by one of its former directors, was written today into the records of the congressional committee conducting an inquiry into business conducted by the government.

The attack was made by Lawrence Farlow, Bloomington, Ill., a director of the farmers national grain dealers association. Farlow, who resigned as a director of the farmers national grain corporation in 1930 because of difference over policies, told the committee the set-up was neither farmer-owned, nor controlled and it was not working in the interests of the farmer.

He said the farmers national cannot be owned by the producers, "because the farmers had paid in \$45,260 to a ten-million dollar corporation when I left. It now is indebted to the farm board for 16 million dollars."

"On important matters of policy," he testified, "the farm board is absolutely dictated to the farmers national."
