VIGOROUS YOUNG MEN PLAN SPAIN'S 10-YEAR DRIVE

MADRID (AP) — Fifteen young men of the rising Republican generation have been enlisted with mapping a ten-year plan for Spain. The men range in age from 25 to 32 years and include lawyers, professors, engineers and business men.

The scheme in theory is similar to the Russian five-year plan. It contemplates industrial and agricultural expansion, power dam and irrigation projects. Marcelo Domingo, minister of industry, explained that the planners were picked from men virtually unknown in national affairs because the government wanted "the young, vigorous, aggressive generation" to look ahead and guide the nation toward a better future. The first rough draft of the 10-year plan is to be ready by October.

MACHINE GUN PRACTICE IRKS FRENCH VETERANS
