PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 3 (AP)—As generally anticipated, eggs moved up a cent on extras and standards on the exchange here for today's trading.

Butter and cheese markets appeared virtually unchanged for the day following the advance of 1c on top score butter Monday.

Corn is a little more plentiful in the wholesale trade and today was slightly lower at \$1.25. Quality of some is very good but there continues to be a considerable amount of poor grade stuff.

Fresh dill is now offered at a dime a pound. First offerings are about sufficient to meet the demand.

Violent Advance In Wall Street; Closing Buoyant

NEW YORK, Aug. 3 (AP)—Bears who had been playing for a reaction in the stock market were trapped in the most violent advance of the year today. Prices of many leaders shot up 2 to about 7 points, and the closing tone was buoyant. Transfers were close to 2,500,000 shares.

The sell-off of the previous session completely petered out in the first half hour today, but some short selling in expectation of a sizeable recovery continued until after midday, when bears nervously began to cover, and found the market devoid of nearby offerings in the leaders. The panicky effort to cover sent prices whirling. Sympathetic advances appeared in wheat and in the bond market.
