Presidential Campaign Difficult To Analyze At This Time of The Year

It is well to have firmly in mind during the season of midsummer election forecasts, certain basic aspects of the present campaign. This is no ordinary campaign year. The country is passing through one of the severest trials in its history. The voters are restless under the strain of their individual and collective worries. Large sections appear almost on the verge of political hysteria.

SINCE 1903
No clear picture of the possibilities can even be approximated without putting political buncombe aside and examining the fundamental facts.

The latest available index to voter opinion on a national scale was provided by the congressional elections of 1930. In that year the nation arrived at what to all intents and purposes was a tie. Almost equal number of Democrats and Republicans were elected.

What has happened since 1930? Economically, the depression has continued, so that in spite of some signs of upturn millions still are out of work, dispirited, reflective. Politically, the Democrats have assumed a measure of responsibility by their control of the last house, which now is asked to share with the Republican administration the accumulating resentments of the discontented.

Working in cooperation with the Legion convention committee at Portland, dates for this year's Round-Up were set just previous to the veterans' convalesce in order that they might witness the classic that keeps alive the traditions of the range of a day that is gone.

According to information given out by one railroad, twelve of its special trains carrying veterans from the east to Portland will be sidetracked at Pendleton while the

delegates attend the exhibition. Other specials will provide the same accommodations, it is asserted. The number of veterans arriving by train will be augmented by those traveling in auto caravans being formed with the object of making their first stop at Pendleton Round-Up, then winding down the famous Columbia River highway into Portland.

Cash prizes of approximately \$20,000 will be distributed among famous top hands of the country at this year's Round-Up. Strings of notorious bucking horses will be on hand, some of which never have been ridden the ten seconds allotted the cowboy to prove his sticking ability.

Sheer bulldozing and calf-roping provide more thrills, while the stage coach races are reminiscent

of the days when the Wells-Fargo Express traveled the perilous trails of the west. One of the spectacular sights is 2000 Indians dressed in richly beaded costumes, performing war dances. These Indians camp in the Round-Up grounds, their gambling games with sticks proving something new in entertainment for the whites.

Happy Canyon is the evening show, a pantomime portrayal of the coming of the first white man and his fight for survival against the Indians. Later the scene changes and the visitor gets a glimpse of the typical cowtown of pioneer days with its dance halls, saloons and gambling dens.

At the close of this show the audience takes part in the gaming and finds refreshment at the old fashioned bar.
