

Christian Church Vacation Ends, Regular Services to Start Sunday

Baker Editor To Be Speaker For Presbyterians

Bernard Mainwaring, Elder Commissioner to Assembly at Denver, Will Be Here Sunday.

The July vacation is past, and all departments of the Church of Christ will begin functioning in full capacity with Sunday's services. The pastor, Rev. Paul De F. Mortimore, and his family are home again after spending the month in Portland and other Western Oregon points, and Mr. Mortimore will preach both morning and evening Sunday.

The Bible school will meet as usual at 9:45 a. m. There are interesting classes for every age in this school. The attendance this summer has been exceptionally fine, a high record being established for July of 1932. All who are interested are invited to this school.

At 11 a. m. the regular communion service will be observed. At this service the choir will sing an anthem, and the pastor will bring the morning message, using for a subject, "The Deepening Emphasis in Religion."

Christian Endeavor will meet at 6:45 p. m. All young people who en-

joy fellowship and discussion of life problems are invited. The evening services for the remainder of the summer months will be devoted to practical religious problems. During his vacation Mr. Mortimore has been making an intensive study of the relation of religion to the present unsettled condition of things, and he is planning to bring the results of his study to the evening services. His sermon topic will be, "Religion or Politics." In relation to this subject he says, "It was my privilege to be in the capital of our nation and interview some of the high officials during my visit last month. I discovered certain things which I believe to be highly significant. That we are headed for a new order of things, no one can doubt. The direction which this new order takes depends very largely upon the attitudes of Christian people. I want to give a personal invitation to the people of La Grande to hear my sermon Sunday evening."

St. Peter's Church (Episcopal) (Fourth street and O avenue) The services at St. Peter's church on Sunday will consist of a celebration of the Holy communion at 8:00 o'clock and Holy communion and sermon at 11:00 o'clock. Everyone is cordially invited to attend these services.

Church of God (Spruce street at X avenue) Two services are scheduled for Sunday at the Church of God. Sun-

day school will begin at 10 a. m. with the lesson subject "The Ten Commandments." The morning service will open at 11 o'clock with Rev. Carlos A. Plummer the pastor, to speak on "Loving and Obeying God." Miss Leola Miller is organist. Special music will include an original song entitled "Jesus, The Christ."

Presbyterian Church (Sixth and Washington) Bernard Mainwaring, editor of the Democrat-Herald, of Baker, will be the speaker at the 11:00 o'clock service hour, Sunday morning, at the Presbyterian church. Mr. Mainwaring was elder commissioner to the general assembly of the Presbyterian church, held at Denver recently, representing the Presbytery of Grande Ronde. The time will be given to a report of that body. He is a careful observer and will bring an informative message. Mrs. Florence Lynch Miller, soprano, will sing at this service, and Miss Edris Maguire will preside at the organ console. A cordial invitation is extended to all who would attend.

Bible school opens at 9:45 a. m. with classes for all ages, competent teachers and interesting lessons. Christian Endeavor will meet at 6:30 in the church parlor. Last Sunday evening it was a most unique setting that welcomed the Endeavorers. Mildred Stoddard was leader, calling the assembly to order with the words, "We gathered about the campfire, seated on the floor, mission fashion, and studied the necessary moral and spiritual equipment of a missionary. Another splendid program awaits those who attend this Sunday evening."

Baptist Church (Sixth and Spring) At the Baptist church Sunday morning the pastor will take as his theme "The Church." By request Mrs. St. John and Mrs. Moore will repeat the duet "I'm a Pilgrim" which they sang last Sunday morning. The young people will not hold their meetings during the month of August. The subject of the evening sermon will be "The Spirit of Anti-Christ." Hours of services are: Bible school, J. First Church of Christ, Scientist (First and Washington) "Spirit" will be the subject of the lesson-sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientists, on Sunday, Aug. 7. Among the citations which comprise the lesson-sermon will be the following from the Bible: "The flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh" (Gal. 5:17). The lesson-sermon also will include the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "No more sympathy exists between the flesh and Spirit than between Belial and Christ." "This material world is even now becoming the arena for conflicting forces. On one side there will be discord and dismay; on the other side there will be science and peace. The breaking up of material beliefs may seem to be famine and pestilence, want and woe, sin, sickness, and death, which assume new phases until their nothingness appears. These disturbances will continue until the end of error, when all discord will be swallowed up in spiritual Truth. Mortal error will vanish in a moral chemicalization. This mental fermentation has begun, and will continue until all errors of belief yield to understanding" (pp. 171 and 96).

KREUGER CRASH REMINDER MARKS STOCKHOLM SQUARE STOCKHOLM (AP) — Resplendent with grayish-green marble and stainless steel, the office building which Ivar Kreuger started for the Kreuger & Toll company is nearing completion, a reminder of one of the world's worst business crashes.

The building is of modern design, with the top three of the eight stories in set-back style, faced with stainless steel. Kreuger tore down several old buildings in Norrmalmstorg, a square in the heart of the city, to make room for the new building. He refused a request of the city to build elsewhere so the square could be enlarged.

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
